Domestic Violence Awareness Month

The month of October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month, so I wanted to talk about domestic

Our town has very little crime to speak of compared to other cities and towns. Nevertheless, offenses such as domestic violence have remained constant over the years and are sometimes heightened in a bad economy.

Domestic violence is defined as, "Violent or aggressive behavior within the home, typically involving the violent abuse of a spouse or partner. according to the National Domestic Violence Hotline.

Even though the majority of cases seem to be violence against a wife or female partner, there are also

many cases of harm and abuse that come to husbands and male partners.

Thousands of women, children, and men live with domestic violence day-to-day and are afraid to report their situations to the authorities. Unfortunately, it is likely that the prevalence of domestic violence in our own towns is much higher than what is reported for a number of reasons. These reasons can range from fear of not being believed to being brainwashed into believing that the situation is the victim's fault. It is crucial to bring more awareness to what domestic violence is and how the cycle can be broken. Domestic violence involves willful intimidation, physical assault, battery, sexual assault, and other abusive behavior perpetrated by an intimate partner against







My wife and I spent a lovely week in Paris back in July and, I regret to admit, you may have helped pay for it.

No, I am not talking about the fact that my salary as New Hampshire's Consumer Advocate is recovered from the state's utility customers. I am, rather, referring to the fact that many Granite Staters now pay their bills with credit cards issued by Visa and Mastercard.

When I got married in 2014, I started sharing with my spouse her "United Airlines Explorer MileagePlus" Visa card. When we use our family Visa card to pay for stuff, we earn frequent flyer miles with United. We redeem the miles and take vacations in places like Paris, Barcelona, and my grandmother's home town of Butte, Montana.

Visa, Mastercard, and the financial institutions that issue credit cards under those logos would like you to think that these frequent flyer miles, and other perks that go along with using many credit cards, are free. They are not.

Every time you use a credit card – including when you pay your bill for electricity or gas – the other party to the transaction must pay an "interchange" fee to the credit card processor. These interchange fees – sometimes called swipe fees — actually vary by credit card; the more lavish the perks associated with the card, the higher the swipe fee.

Some portion of the especially bloated interchange fees associated with cards like mine goes to the airline to pay for the miles or to whatever other company – hotels, retailers, whatever — is providing the "free" benefits. Nice for me, but what about you?

Well, guess what. Those swipe fees are embedded in the prices we all pay for everything we buy. That includes electric and gas service from Eversource, Liberty, the New Hampshire Electric Cooperative or Unitil, all of which are entitled to recover these costs from customers.

Kudos to a bipartisan group of U.S. Senators – Dick Durbin of Illinois, Senator Peter Welch of Vermont, Senator Roger Marshall of Kansas, and Senator J.D. Vance of Ohio – for sponsoring the proposed Credit Card Competition Act of 2023. It's S. 1838, for those who keep score.

The same bill is pending in the House, as H.R. 3881. The lead sponsor there is Rep. Lance Gooden,

a Republican from Texas.

According to a fact sheet from Senator Durbin's office, if the Credit Card Competition Act becomes law "the giant banks that issue the overwhelming majority of Visa and Mastercard credit cards would have to choose a second competitive network to go on each card, and then a merchant would get to choose which of those networks to use to process a transaction."

Translation: There would be competition among credit card processing networks.

Which, in turn, would save consumers money. According to Senator Durbin's fact sheet, "every time a Visa or Mastercard credit card is swiped, around two to three percent is deducted out of the transaction amount the merchant actually receives," almost all of it going to interchange fees.

When I pay my credit card bill every month, which I do in full to avoid the exorbitant interest rates associated with credit cards, I do so out of a checking account at a local credit union. I bank exclusively with credit unions because they are not-for-profit financial institutions that are owned and ostensibly controlled by the people who use them.

You would think that consumer-owned financial institutions – credit unions – would be enthusiastic supporters of the Credit Card Competition Act in order to help their members save money. Wrong!

"This 'big box bill' is just another way for large merchants to squeeze more out of the American consumers' pockets by disrupting payment systems that consumers want in place, leaving them vulnerable," said Jim Nussle, president and CEO of the Credit Union National Association (CUNA) the day the bill was introduced.

"CUNA, state credit union Leagues, and credit unions oppose these changes to the current interchange system, and vow to protect the more than 135 million credit union members across the country who don't deserve to suffer from a government mandate that will shift costs and risks to them," Nussle added.

Okay, but the Credit Card Competition Act would apply only to financial institutions with assets over \$100 billion. New Hampshire's biggest credit union, the Portsmouth-based Service Credit Union, has about \$5.2 billion in assets.

So I don't get why New Hampshire's credit unions are falling in line with CUNA, and the banking monoliths, in opposing reforms in the credit card industry. It is especially sad given that the nation's credit union movement began right here in New Hampshire (the oldest credit union in the U.S. being the Manchesterbased St. Mary's Bank).

Meanwhile, as Consumer Advocate I have fought and lost the battle to keep credit card swipe fees out of utility rates. Our utilities argue, credibly, that their customers want to pay their bills with Visa or Mastercard because it is so convenient.

Okay, but as the person tasked by statute with protecting the interests of New Hampshire's residential utility customers I beg you not to use your credit card if you are having trouble paying your utility bill. Paying credit card interest on the cost of your utility bill is unnecessary when the utilities have help available to financially challenged customers.

Winter looms and, with it, utility bills that are unbearable for many. If you need help, ask your utility or your local Community Action Agency to refer you to one of the ratepayer-funded bill assistance programs. Because the last thing you want to do in an energy affordability crisis is to help other people pay for their vacations.

outdoors; some were more successful than others. As life got busier, I haven't thought about starting an herb garden until recently. There's something about the aroma fresh herbs bring into the house that reminds me of family gatherings. Basil, rosemary, and oregano bring back fond memories of my dad's homemade pizza sauce, and my mom's delicious baked chicken or roasts for Sunday dinners. A few basic principles to keep in mind when growing any plant inside.

how much sun your window receives each day. Some Bouquet Garni and of Herbes de Provence. plants require a minimum of six to eight hours of sun a day to thrive, while some plants need a minimum of four to six hours of sun a day.


2. Plant in containers with good drainage. You including a few she's had for over 20 years. don't want them to get waterlogged.

3. Find the best potting soil you can find. An organic potting mix designed for containers that's high in organic matter and peat-free is ideal.

4. Choose a few herb plants or seeds that you cook with the most. Start with two to five plants.

I have found some herbs that are easy to grow and tolerant of growing in confined spaces.







Basil

Water regularly – Basil likes to stay moist so keep the soil from drying out, but needs at least three to six hours of sunlight daily. Keep harvesting basil throughout the growing season. Remove 1/3 of the leaves each month to encourage new growth. I prefer to freeze basil by chopping it, placing in an ice cube tray, and covering with olive oil. Once the basil cubes are frozen, store them in an airtight container in your freezer. When you need a bit of basil in a dish, simply add a cube or two. Basil goes well in salads, pasta dishes, pizza and pesto.

Bay

Bay laurel is a perennial that actually does best using the container gardening method. Place the pot in an east or west window as it prefers full to partial sun. Thin the plant if it starts to get crowded. Bay needs air circulation to remain healthy. Bay leaf is a standard cooking ingredient in many savory dishes such as soups, stews, and sauces. Just remove them prior to serving because they have a bitter taste.

Chervil

Is a delicate annual and a favorite flavor in French cuisine and its nickname is "French parsley." Chervil prefers part light but needs temperatures between 65 degrees and 70 degrees to thrive. Like basil, chervil will grow fuller if you pinch the tops occasionally. Add the leaves to soups, fish, veggies, and poultry. You can also use it to make your own herb butter.

Chives

This oniony herb does quite well in a container with full sun. If you have one already in your garden, you can move it inside at the end of the growing season. Leave the pot outside until the leaves die back. In early winter, move the pot to your coolest indoor spot, like your basement, for a few days. Then place it in your brightest window. Mince the leaves and sprinkle them in soups, salads, and on top of eggs or baked potatoes. Even the purple flowers are edible and make great garnishes.

Oregano

Oregano is described by the Greeks a "joy of the mountain" and originates from the hilly, Greek countryside and is now grown all over the world. Go easy on the watering. It doesn't need as much as other herbs, so wait until the soil feels dry to the touch. Regular trimming will keep your plant looking healthy and full. Oregano is a much-loved herb, pungent, spicy and slightly bitter. Goes well with any vegetable and Mediterranean dishes.

Rosemary

You can start with a cutting of rosemary and keep it in a moist soilless potting mix until it roots. It grows best in south-facing windows with good drainage. Prune regularly (up to a third of the plant) and dry any extra stems to flavor winter stews and soups. Your kitchen will smell fresh throughout the cooler seasons thanks to the pungent scent of this herb. It acts like a natural air freshener. Good with

Sage


Take a tip cutting from an indoor plant. Needs Over the years I have grown herbs indoors and strong sun from a south facing window. Tolerates dry, indoor air well. Sage is native to the Mediterranean region and is used fresh or dried in flavorings for many foods particularly in stuffing for poultry, pork and sausages. It is cultivated for its pungent edible leaves. Sage has slightly stimulating properties. Tea brewed from its leaves has been used as a tonic for centuries. In medieval Europe, sage was thought to strengthen the memory and promote wisdom. Burning sage, also known as cleansing, is an ancient spiritual ritual.

Thyme

You can root from a soft tip of an indoor plant or repot an existing plant. Does well in east or west facing window. Keep soil moist. Thyme is indigenous to the Mediterranean region. Ancient Egyptians used I have found three websites that have a wide thyme for embalming. The ancient Greeks used it in their baths and burnt it as incense in their temples believing it was a source of courage. The Romans used it to purify their rooms and to give an aromatic flavor to cheese and liqueurs. Add to roasts, sauces, soups and dressings. Infuse in honey or vinegar. 



Why Shop Indie Local?

Where you spend your hard-earned dollars matters. Your choices create a ripple effect that starts with you and extends out to our entire region and local economy. Shop Indie Local (shop at independent and locally owned businesses) and the positive ripple effects grow.

When you spend your dollars at locally owned retail businesses in the Monadnock Region, four times more money returns to our local economy than if you spend that same dollar at a chain store. Spend a dollar at an independent business and 62 cents return to our local economy. (Spend it at a chain store and only 13 cents return; spend it at an online giant and only a couple of pennies return.)

Those 62 cents recirculate through our economy, generating ripple effects that increase job growth, charitable contributions, and community prosperity. If everyone shifted just 10 percent of their purchases from national chains to locally owned retailers, we would return \$27 million to our regional economy annually.

We Asked a Local

What did locally owned businesses share when we asked for unique gift ideas? 

This kind of violence often escalates from threats and manipulation to verbal abuse and or physical violence. This kind of violent behavior can directly harm the victims, but it also affects any children living in the home. According to the National Network to End Domestic Violence, approximately 15.5 million children are exposed to domestic violence each and every year. These children will likely grow up experiencing mood disorders such as anxiety, anger, and may even grow to perpetuate the behavior that was impressed upon them from a young age, thus continuing the cycle of domestic abuse in one form or another.

According to the National Domestic Violence Hotline, some signs that you or someone you love may be involved in a domestic violence situation include: feeling trapped, chronic humiliation from a partner, verbal insults, physical violence, controlling behavior from a partner, unpredictable mood swings, alienating friends and family, and manipulation, to name a few.

Bring awareness to domestic violence and other forms of abuse that go on.



Celebrate The Season With Autumn Arts And Crafts

As the weather gets cooler, keep kids busy with creating fun crafts featuring the beautiful colors of the season. You don't need to use a lot of elaborate and expensive supplies to get kids into the crafting spirit. Some materials can be found in nature. Bring the kids outside to collect leaves, pinecones, pebbles, twigs, acorns, etc. Look around your home for some other materials like aluminum foil, yarn, tissue paper, fabric scraps, buttons, etc.

Try making your own playdough. In a large pot, stir together two cups flour, 3/4 cup salt, and four teaspoons cream of tartar. Add two cups lukewarm water and two tablespoons vegetable oil. Stir constantly over medium heat until dough thickens and begins to form a ball. Remove from heat and allow the dough to cool on a piece of wax paper. Once cool, divide the dough into balls and add a few drops of food coloring to each one. To keep hands clean, try putting the dough and coloring into zip lock bags and knead the dough inside the sealed bag to distribute color evenly. Add more color as desired to get a more vibrant shade. Store the dough in the sealed bags when not in use to keep it from drying out.

Use your child's handprint to create some fallthemed art projects. Your child can create autumn trees. Trace your child's arm, wrist, and hand with fingers spread onto brown construction paper to make a tree trunk and branches. Cut out the tree trunk and paste it onto another piece of paper. Create colorful leaves by gluing bits of tissue paper onto the finger branches to form fall leaves. Put some additional leaves around the base of the tree for the leaves that have fallen to the ground.

Create a "stained glass" leaf masterpiece. Have your child collect some brightly colored leaves. Cut two pieces of wax paper that are the same size. Arrange the leaves onto one piece of wax paper as desired and then place the other piece on top. Cover with a thin towel and iron so that the wax melts slightly to adhere the two pieces together with the arrangement of leaves between them. Hang the leaves in a window. The sunlight coming through the window will shine through the picture like stained glass.

Create a fall-themed fluffy slime with your kids. This is both a recipe for a fun tactile activity as well as a science experiment. You will need 1/2 cup white

glue, 3 cups foam shaving cream, 1/2 teaspoon baking soda, food coloring, and 1 tablespoon saline solution. Mix together glue, shaving cream, and baking soda in a bowl. Add desired color food coloring. To achieve brighter colors, you will need to use more coloring. Add the saline solution and stir. This is the active ingredient to turn the glue mixture into slime consistency. Knead the slime mixture to get it to a good consistency. It can help to squirt a few drops of the saline solution onto hands before kneading the slime. The extra saline will reduce some of the stickiness, but too much will create a stiffer slime. Store the slime in containers and slime will keep for several weeks.

Raking or leaf blowers are better for the insects because it keeps the structure of the leaves intact and allows insulating air spaces within a leaf pile. You can rake the leaves off your lawn, but a layer of leaves on a flower bed or around a tree base provides winter cover. Heat rises and top insulation is very effective. shelter. Leaf blankets should be at least two to three inches thick to provide effective insulation. If you have the space, a small brush or leaf pile provides shelter for both insects and small burrowing animals.



In your flower beds, cut back your tall plant stems for a tidy look but leave six to 12 inches of stalk. Hollow stemmed plants provide shelter for insects.

In the spring, Xerces recommends a couple of pracblossom, the ground and leaf nesting insects have about pollinators in local schools.

Now is the time to execute every step in the winter check list. First, install mouse guards. Once the colony hard clusters, a mouse can take up residence in the hive and consume much of the stores that the bees will need for winter. I prefer a metal mouse guard because a wooden guard can be gnawed and defeated. Second, check honey reserves and provide a sugar or candy board if the hive is low on stores. Third, insulate the colony, especially above the inner Fourth, provide a wind break at the entrance so that wind gusts will not disturb the colony.

During this winterization process try not to break the propolis seals to the bottom board or between the brood boxes and the supers. The bees have worked hard to seal any crack and breaking these now will not give the colony the time to reseal the hive.

Pete's Stand is a mixed vegetable farm with 50 acres in production on fields and in two high tunnels in New Hampshire and Vermont. It is owned and operated by Teresa and John Janiszyn, who are

the third generation of the Janiszyn family to be working this land over the past 50 years.

Seeing the positive impact that the farm can have on child development through their own children, the Janiszyns have worked with the Windham Northeast Supervisory Union to create farm-to-school programs for the region's youth. They have incorporated farm fresh food into menus, have had farm field trips, and made classroom visits so youth can develop a relationship with the farm.



Cranberries Offer Versatility And Nutrition

Cranberries, probably first called "crane berries," were so named because cranes living near cranberry bogs fed on the fruit. The nearby marshy waters of Cape Cod are one prime source of this native berry, first utilized by native American Indian tribes. Cranberries, in my opinion, are one of the most unappreciated foods on the market. Few fruits are as versatile, inexpensive, tasty, easy to use, nutritious, and quick to freeze. They are the "what more could you ask for" fruit. Now is the time of year to purchase cranberries for holiday cooking and freezing for use all year. These red jewels are delicious in breads, pies, muffins, granola, and puddings. Try them in stuffing and in poultry, game, or beef dishes, as well as in soups and stews. Cook them with vegetables such as carrots, pearl onions, red cabbage, and beets. And don't forget, cranberry jelly, marmalade, chutney, relish, and vinegar. Or try some favorites from Cooking Corner.

Sausage Hors d'oeuvres with **Cranberry Sauce**

If you're looking for a satisfying pre-dinner snack or buffet platter, this could become a favorite. Makes about 10 to 12 servings.

Ingredients:

2 cups fresh or frozen cranberries

3/4 cup red currant jelly

1/4 cup sugar

2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice

3 tablespoons port wine

1 tablespoon Dijon mustard

1 tablespoon finely minced onion or shallot grated zest of 1 lemon

grated zest of 1 orange

21/2 lbs. kielbasa or Italian sausage, cut into bitesized pieces; cooked until well-browned

Place cranberries, jelly and sugar in small saucepan. Simmer over medium heat until cranberry skins pop and jelly melts, about 15 minutes. Place mixture in blender and add lemon juice, port, mustard, onion and both zests; blend until smooth. Keep mixture warm in a chafing dish or fondue pot. Arrange sausages on a platter and serve with toothpicks for 1/4 cup flour dipping into the sauce.

Cranberry Vinaigrette

Use this slightly creamy dressing on fall fruit salads with pears, apples and grapes; drizzle over pieces of smoked trout or atop slices of smoked salmon.

1/3 cup cranberries, fresh or frozen

1 tablespoon parsley leaves

11/2 teaspoons Dijon mustard

1/2 cup sunflower or light olive oil

1/4 cup red wine vinegar or rice vinegar

1 tablespoon sugar or more, depending on tartness of cranberries

salt and freshly ground black pepper

In a food processor, finely chop cranberries and parsley by pulsing on and off about three seconds. Add rest of ingredients; whirl until smooth but with flecks of cranberries still visible. Store in a glass jar in refrigerator up to one week; makes one cup.

Cranberry Squash

A simple side dish for holiday meals or any occasion. The not-too-sweet flavor of this side dish pairs with most entrees, from game to poultry. Makes four ams, 22 Birch Road, Hancock, NH 03449. servings.

Ingredients:

- 2 cups cooked and mashed winter squash (Hubbard or butternut)
- 2 tablespoons light or dark brown sugar
- 1 egg, beaten
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- 3/4 cup cranberries, halved or coarsely chopped salt and pepper
- 1 tablespoon butter

In a medium bowl, mix all ingredients together spoon into a casserole dish. Dot top with on tablespoon butter and bake at 400 degrees for 35 minutes.

Cranberry Meat Loaf

I love the tart taste of the cranberry sauce that both enhances the meat loaf itself and adds more flavor as a glaze on top. Makes six servings.

Ingredients:

2 cups fresh or frozen cranberries

1/2 cup sugar

1 cup water

2 lbs. hamburg (or any combination of hamburg, ground pork or ground turkey)

1/2 cup dry bread crumbs

3 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley

1/2 small onion, finely chopped

1/4 teaspoon salt

freshly ground black pepper

Combine cranberries, sugar and water in medium saucepan. Bring to a boil and cook over medium-low heat until berries pop, five to 10 minutes. Remove sauce from heat and set aside to cool. Combine hamburg with remaining ingredients to make meatloaf. Add one half cup of the cranberry sauce and mix well. Shape meat into oval loaf and place in pie plate. Bake at 375 degrees for 40 minutes. Pour remaining sauce over meat loaf and bake 15 to 20 minutes longer.



Cranberry Raisin Pie

Similar to a mincemeat pie but with the added nutrition of cranberries.

Ingredients:

2 cups fresh or frozen cranberries

2 cups raisins

1 cup sugar

pinch salt

2/3 cup water 1½ tablespoons lemon juice

grated peel of 1 orange

1/2 teaspoon orange or almond extract

2 nine-inch pie crusts, you own or packaged 1/2 cup toasted, slivered almonds, cooled

In medium saucepan, combine cranberries, raisins, sugar, flour, and salt; add water and stir. Cook and stir over medium heat until cranberries pop and mixture is slightly thickened, six to eight minutes. Remove from heat and cool to lukewarm. Add lemon juice, orange peel, and extract. Line nine-inch dish with one crust. Mix almonds into cranberries and pour into pie shell. Top with second pie crust and crimp edges; slit top for steam to escape. Bake in preheated 425 degree oven for 15 minutes; reduce heat to 375 degrees and bake 15 to 20 minutes longer, until filling is bubbly and crust is nicely browned. Cool on wire rack. Serve with ice cream if desired.

Healing Substance Use Disorder

Treatment Week: October 16th to 22nd.

The American Society of Addiction Medicine created this public outreach to raise awareness that addiction is a chronic, treatable disease; challenge the stigma surrounding addiction; and inspire others in the medical community to learn about and treat

It's hard to imagine another illness with the impact that substance use disorder has. The numbers are staggering. In 2018, 20.3 million people in the US had a substance use disorder related to drugs or alcohol. It's a rare person who hasn't been affected by addiction - personally, with family, friends, coworkers, or neighbors. And yet, sadly, only one in 10 people suffering from substance use seeks treatment.

But there is good news. Modern medicine and brain research have brought remarkable growth in the understanding of what is happening within a person's body when they develop addiction, and how they recover and heal. This science has greatly informed the growing field of addiction medicine,

As I write this article, it is National Addiction individualized, holistic, evidence-based, comprehensive, and successful.

The American Society of Addiction Medicine now defines addiction as a treatable chronic illness involving complex interactions among brain circuits, other body systems, genetics, life experiences, social factors, and exposure to certain substances or activities. Medications, targeted nutritional interventions, lifestyle changes, chronic stress and trauma healing, supportive relationships, and social support all can be part of skillful, compassionate, successful treatment.



Lack of understanding and stigma are major barriers to addiction treatment. Though it is absolutely untrue, addiction is still too often seen as a personal and helped guide approaches to treatment that are moral weakness, or a failure of willpower. Public per-

ception of addiction and lack of education among healthcare providers has created a scenario where people with this illness struggle with shame, lack of hope, fear, isolation, and despair.

People primarily use drugs and alcohol for two reasons. One is to feel good or different – to explore and experience new mental and physical sensations. This is something most people do at various times in life. The other is to feel better - to try to alleviate physical, mental, and emotional pain. Whatever the motivation, ongoing use increases the risk for compulsive use. For vulnerable people, body and brain changes are significant and progressive, and use of the substance or activity continues, despite mounting negative consequences. That is the definition of addiction.

Stigmatizing language is painful and destructive. People with substance use disorder are often labeled "addicts." We use terms like clean and dirty, abuser, junkie, drunk. With what other illness do we see such language? These words feed into illinformed attitudes that pervade the atmosphere for people with substance use problems who need or are seeking help.

Much of the pervasive stigma about addiction as a "moral weakness" comes from the fact that patients are not receiving evidence-based care. The breakthroughs and understanding of the illness of addiction and the pathways of treatment nd recovery are still not well understood by the public and many professionals. This is why public awareness initiatives like Addiction Treatment Week are so important.

Substance use disorder is similar to many chronic illnesses. Chronic illnesses are often multifaceted, involving interactions of multiple root causes. Recovery and healing can include episodes of flare ups and recurrence. The most successful treatment plans are individualized and robust. Care of the physical aspects, along with the mental, emotional, spiritual, and social aspects of the illness are essential.




