On Friday, March 22nd the trio will be at Stonewall Farm at 242 Chesterfield Road in Keene at 7:30 p.m., and on Sunday, March 24th at 3 p.m. at The Park Theatre in Jaffrey.

The program includes Schubert, Brahms & Chopin Piano Trios. Since his last visit in November, Johnston has been busy touring the UK and Ireland as soloist with Britten Sinfonia and recording a new concerto with the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra. Ahead of the two concerts, the trio will be visiting $Trinity\,Christian\,School, St.\,Joseph's\,Regional\,School,$ and Wheelock Elementary School. State Activates Info Center – **Everything About The April 8th Eclipse**

State agencies have been working diligently alongside local communities and businesses to prepare for the solar eclipse that will occur April 8th.

While all of New Hampshire will experience the eclipse, the northernmost part of the state, from the area of Lancaster north to the Canadian border, will experience totality. The rest of New Hampshire will experience a partial eclipse at about 95 percent totality. Totality in the Great North Woods will last approximately three minutes and 30 seconds and will vary slightly from west to east as it begins and ends.

As part of the state's planning, the Joint Information Center (JIC) will be activated starting Thursday, February 29th from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday. The purpose of the

JIC is to coordinate information being shared by state agencies to the public and members of the media.

'New Hampshire is the place to be on April 8th – no other spot can eclipse the views we'll have in the North Country!" said Governor Chris Sununu. "From making viewing glasses available to schools to working hand in hand with towns, we're on-track for a truly stellar day."

Spaces Worth Saving Forum In Swanzey Tuesday, March 26th

Residents are invited to discuss Swanzey's natural resources and to offer input on future conservation planning at an upcoming community forum on Tuesday, March 26th at 6:30 pm at Whitcomb Hall on Main Street.

Swanzey's Open Space Plan is 20 years old, and the town is seeing a surge of development. Last year, the Swanzey Conservation Commission initiated the process of updating the plan, which will articulate the town's vision for natural resource protection and land conservation in light of today's development pressures.

The commission has contracted with Moosewood Ecological LLC of Chesterfield to assist with this project, which includes biodiversity assessments and wetlands evaluations in preparation of the plan. Ongoing community outreach and engagement is key for the overall success of the Open Space Conservation Plan.

NHSaves Button Up Workshop

The presentation covers the energy efficiency programs offered by New Hampshire utilities (for existing homes and new construction) that provide rebates and reduced costs for energy audits, weatherization measures such as air sealing and insulating, and new products such as electric and gas appliances and high-efficiency electric heating/cooling equipment.

Residents wishing to use energy more efficiently, conserve energy, and save money will find the workshop presentation helpful. The workshop is free and no registration is necessary.

Keene State College Joins Worldwide Ranks Of All-Steinway Schools

In the minds of many involved with the yearslong project, it is a moment to open the windows and shout: Keene State College has achieved the designation of All-Steinway School, a distinction that sets its music program apart from all others - public or private – in New Hampshire.

But there's more.

Keene State also becomes just the second public institution in New England to reach All-Steinway status. It can boast of being one of just more than 200 colleges, universities, and conservatories across five continents to display the iconic insignia, a symbol of excellence for more than a century and a half.

And there's more still.

Keene State is just the third institution in the All-Steinway family to adopt the Spirio technology for the concert stage and institutional use. Brown and Harvard are the others, and MIT will become the fourth, said Patrick Elisha of M. Steinert & Sons, the oldest independent Steinway dealer in the world.

Among the All-Steinway Schools are The Juilliard School in New York, Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, Oberlin Conservatory of Music, Yale School of Music, and Beijing's Central Conservatory of Music, School of Piano.

ConVal Students Recognized For Excellent Performance In National German Exam

ConVal High School (CVHS) students were recently recognized for their excellent results after taking the National German Exams sponsored by the American Association of Teachers of German and is administered annually to 20,000 high school students in all 50 states and 20 countries.

Because of his score, Flynn will be eligible to apply for a scholarship for summer study in Germany.

NH Farm Future Fund Announces A Fifth Year Of Funding

Districts will once again request proposals from land trusts who seek fundto conserve their land and improve the viability of their farm business. There is \$100,000 available in the 2024 funding cycle. Awards no greater than \$20,000 will be considered. The NH Farm Future carefully review the request for propos-Fund is an integrated approach to funding farm viability, farmland conservation, and farmland access. Funding is available to support activities in two broad categories: financial assistance to offset costs associated with farmland conservation projects, and technical assistance to support farm business viability and succession planning.

Land trust applicants should be committed to bringing together experts in land conservation, succession planning, award by mid July.

Carrots contain compounds such as: lycopene (another cancer fighter); potassium, a blood pressure regulator; pheolic compounds, which can reduce cardiovascular diseases and help maintain normal blood sugar and cholesterol levels; lutein, the same antioxidant that protects the retina from macular degeneration and may be involved in brain function.

If that's not enough to get you running out to the carrot patch, maybe our Carrot Cake Smoothie will do the trick. Made with carrots (yes, the orange kind), oat milk, cinnamon, and pineapple, it's what you might call a super-fortified and refreshingly delicious indulgence.



The Good Times May Be a Distant Memory

Gov. Chris Sununu may have known something was coming when he announced last year he was not going to run for an unprecedented fifth term.

When he came into office the state was on a run of some fairly significant surpluses with an economy fully recovered from the depth of a major recession if not close to depression.

However, his luck did not hold for his second term when COVID-19 bared its teeth and tanked state finances for about 18 months.

But the infusion of billions of dollars of federal recovery and relief money soon shot up business tax revenues and some others to provide some amazing surpluses, that along with the federal pandemic money allowed the state to do some things it never would have accomplished otherwise.

But as he and budget writers knew, the good times can't last forever as economies have cycles.

An indication of the changing economic picture sits in the state revenue numbers for the shortest month

The best way to describe the returns released last week is flat.

There have been some troubling indicators that the economy on steroids was not permanent like the once white hot real estate market had been a tremendous boost to state revenues for several years, but is down \$21 million from what budget writers estimated it would be.

The market has slowed significantly and the estate transfer tax reflects that due to high prices, low inventory and higher-than-used-to mortgage rates.

Indicators of business activities such as the communications tax, the tobacco tax, and transfers from the Liquor Commission, have been flat or headed in the wrong direction and the warm, nearly snowless winter has added to the woes.

There are two unexpected highlights over the past few months, the Lottery Commission earnings for the Education Trust Fund, which will need it with the rapid expansion of eligibility for the Education Freedom Accounts, expected to grow to about \$50 million to \$60 million if the bill the House passed makes it through the Senate and the governor signs it as he said he would.

The larger than anticipated revenues are courtesy of large jackpots from national lottery games and sports betting, mostly on the Super Bowl.

The other unanticipated pocket of money comes from the "other" category from interest earned from investing all that federal money and surplus revenue in short-term vehicles which February netted \$9 million more than budget writers estimated.

However, the big driver of the state's "good times" has been business taxes, one which reflects national and international economic trends and the other more localized to the state's economy.

revenue accounting for about 40 percent of all state

The Business Profits Tax is largely paid by multinational conglomerates and large national companies which have all had record profits since the federal pandemic money helped fuel their businesses and consequently the state's business tax receipts along with many other states'.

The Business Enterprise Tax, a form of a value added tax, is reliant on state businesses and more reflects the state's economy than the BPT.

Companies that pay both taxes have an offset so the numbers don't always directly reflect the economic health of the state's businesses.

The two business taxes are combined in reports, and for the last three months have been below what budget writers estimated for returns, although they have generally been above what was collected a year ago.

February is not a big month for business tax re-

While business tax revenues were \$2.4 million below estimates of \$22 million in February, for the year to date, collections are above estimates by \$30.4 million, and above last year's revenues by \$15 million.

The state's budget plan anticipates business taxes will produce \$1.247 billion this fiscal year.

According to the Department of Revenue Administration, the increase in business tax revenue over prior year in February was due to strong estimates, returns and extensions, however business tax refunds were \$116.5 million compared to \$57.4 million last fiscal year.

Beginning in tax year 2022 the amount of any overpayment that a business may claim as a credit for future liability is capped at 500 percent of their total tax liability.

The agency said in the year to date, the refunds due to the cap are 45 percent of total refunds.

Along with the cap, the agency has seen the requests for refunds increase recently, which is a drag on the business tax returns but also means those companies will be submitting smaller estimates and returns in the future.

According to the DRA's quarterly report, refund requests have been growing recently.

The requested refunds for business taxes requested for the last quarter from October through December was \$63.2 million from 2,238 businesses, while \$52 million was paid out in the quarter to 2,137 businesses.

At the end of December, \$11.1 million in refund requests were outstanding to 242 businesses.

During the second quarter last year, refunds were \$28.2 million.

The first quarter of this fiscal year from July to September is a similar picture with the refunds \$30 million in the 2024 fiscal year, compared to \$16.2 million a vear ago.

Refund requests have been trending steadily upward over the prior year since the beginning of fiscal year 2022, growing from \$12.7 million in the first quarter of 2022 to \$52 million in the second quarter of 2024.

This does not necessarily indicate the country is heading for a recession, but it certainly does indicate New Hampshire should not expect to experience the record surpluses it has seen since coming out of the pandemic slowdown.

With four months remaining in the 2024 fiscal year, state revenues are \$114.6 million in surplus, while a year ago the revenue surplus stood at \$268 million.

The revenue surplus at the end of the 2023 fiscal year was \$518 million.

This fiscal year with three of the five highest business tax return months ahead, the revenue picture could be good or bad depending largely on how the business tax receipts go.

If they are about what budget writers anticipate, Business taxes are the single biggest source of state an over \$100 million revenue surplus is certainly not bad, but not comparable to the past three fiscal years.

However if the business tax returns reflect a slowing economy, most likely there will not be a deficit but that will be a problem as there are some significant needs to be addressed before the end of the fiscal year June 30th.

The Youth Development Center settlement fund is likely to run out of money soon and will need even more money with proposed changes intended to have most claimants go through the settlement program and not through the courts.


And there are the two court orders on the education funding system that could cost the state an additional \$500 million plus.

Yes, the governor may be leaving state politics at a good time for him.

The next budget is not going to be as easy to pass as the last few and a bipartisan plan approved on a voice vote without a committee of conference is not likely either as happened last year.

The good times may be gone and may be but a memory for the next legislature and its budget writers when they sit down to craft the next biennial budget next year.







Time To Plant

of fresh veggies and flowers from our own gardens put under lights for eight to 10 hours a day. are bubbling up.

It's time to think about starting plants indoors. There are always plenty of garden plants to buy from all of the nurseries in May, but if you have the equipment and space it's nice to start a few favorites inside. You will definitely need a grow light and perhaps a warming mat. Potting soil varies in quality; my favorite is from Vermont Compost Company. They seem to have their ingredients just right, and I never need to add anything more for great results. They have several choices as to what might work for you. I get their Fort Vee because I use soil blocks. I have a soil block making tool that I purchased from Johnny's Seeds years ago. The advantage is that, for some reason, plant roots don't swirl around the edges like they do when planted in plastic pots. When they get a little bigger, I transplant them into CowPots. These are pots made out of old cow manure which can be planted right into the soil without removing them from their pots.

If you don't have a soil block maker, start with trays that you can get at almost any garden store. Many seeds can benefit from a soaking before planting. Small seeds like parsley can be soaked for 20 to 30 minutes, where bigger seeds like peas and beans could be soaked for hours or even overnight. Generally, seeds should be planted about twice as deep as the seed is wide. If you have a choice, go for the plumper, bigger seeds as these tend to be more

When deciding what to plant, ask yourself what your favorite foods are. Plants are actually living, sentient beings and it will be up to you to care for them. This takes attention and the ability to be around to see how they are doing. You don't want to drown them, but the top of the soil should be kept moist until they emerge. They also need to be kept warm.

Over the next several weeks, there will be many chances to start seedlings. If you don't have a lot of room, keep it small. Remember that they will have to be transplanted into larger pots as they grow. A southern window with good light is ideal. I have a small greenhouse, but I keep all of my seedlings in the house until it warms up in April. Then I move them to the greenhouse and put an electric heater out there to keep them warm at night.

This way I have some early tomatoes, basil, and parsley. It won't be long before the thyme, oregano, chives, nettles, and lamium are up. Looking forward to another gardening season!

216 Acres Conserved In Francestown

The Monadnock Conservancy, in collaboration with the children of Diane and John Schott, has accepted the donation of 216 acres of forest and wetlands in Francestown. The property boasts 1400 feet of shoreline on Shattuck Pond - the last remaining unprotected corner of the pond – and 45 acres of wetlands, much of which borders the west side of Pleasant Pond Road.

The land also connects and enlarges, to more than 1000 acres, a major block of previously conserved land, and nearly the entire property is classified as top-tier wildlife habitat by the New Hampshire Wildlife Action Plan.

Diane Schott was a former president of the Monadnock Conservancy's board of trustees; she and John were both passionate defenders of the land in this region. They worked with the conservancy to find the best solution to conserve their Francestown property in honor of their son, Kermit, who died

tragically in 2010. After Diane and John's passing, their surviving children executed their parents' plan to donate the land to the conservancy as the Kermit A. Schott Forest



Copy-Cat Recipe Ideas

Have you ever enjoyed a food dish at a classy restaurant, local diner, or fast-food place that you'd like to be able to recreate at home? People enjoy trying to make favorite dishes at home after dining out because it's a rewarding challenge and generally cost-effective. So-called "Copycat" restaurant recipes mimic popular dishes found at favorite restaurants all over the country - from Olive Garden, Starbucks, and numerous steakhouses to Bonefish Grill, Red Lobster, and Asian restaurants. But the popularity of copycat restaurants mostly reflects people's enjoyment of good food and the fun

of experimenting in the kitchen. This week Cooking Corner shares a few copycat recipes I enjoyed recreating after dining out in a variety of places in New Hampshire, Vermont, and Maine from the 1970s to the 1990s.

1/4 cup heavy cream salt and pepper to taste dash of dry sherry to taste (optional)

In a saucepan, melt butter over medium heat. Add onion and sauté until stir to combine. Add corn, tomatoes, basil and chicken broth; bring to a boil and simmer for 10 to 15 minutes, stirring now and then, until tomatoes are broken up and chowder is heated 2 tablespoons flour through. Add the heavy cream, stirring 1 cup milk or chicken broth to warm, but don't boil. Add salt and pepper to taste, and the sherry, if using. Makes two servings.



Tortilla Crisp

AppetizersMy husband and I used to enjoy an appetizer like this at a popular Keene restaurant in the 1990s. Known at that time, I believe, as 176 Main, that restaurant no longer exists and has been home to various dining spots since. **Ingredients:**

2 tablespoons butter

- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 medium onion, thinly sliced
- 2 cups shredded, cooked chicken 1 teaspoon liquid smoke
- barbecue sauce of choice
- 11/2 cups shredded cheddar or Monterey Jack cheese
- 4 (10-inch) flour tortillas

In a heavy skillet, melt butter; sprinkle on sugar. Brown onion slices over medium heat in the butter, stirring and cooking until onion is nicely caramelized (this may take 10 to 15 minutes, so lower the heat, if needed, so onions color but don't burn); set aside. Combine chicken with liquid smoke; set aside. Top each tortilla with a thin layer of barbecue sauce. Add the caramelize onions and chicken, dividing among the four tortillas; top each with cheese. Bake in preheated 425 degree oven until crispy, watching closely that they don't burn. Cut crisps into quarters; serves eight.

Corn-Tomato Chowder

Many times in the late 1970s, my mother and I stopped at the Country Girl Diner in Chester, VT. A favorite order was always their corn-tomato chowder. Between mom and I, we created a copycat recipe that I still make today. The Country Girl Diner, an authentic Silk City Silver dining car, has been in its present location since 1966 after some time spent in Jaffrey. To my knowledge, the chowder is no longer on the menu at the diner.

Ingredients:

- 1 tablespoon bacon fat or butter
- 1/2 small onion
- 1 tablespoon flour 1 (14 oz.) can corn
- 1 (14.5 oz.) can diced tomatoes, lightly
- drained 1/2 teaspoon dried basil, more or less to taste
- 1 cup chicken broth or water

A Trio of Salads

Over the past 40 or so years, I've enjoyed a wide variety of salads at restaurants from New Hampshire to Maine. Here are my versions of three of the best, made for one serving. All are served with a maple vinaigrette (recipe follows) or sweet and sour dressing of your choice:

Lodge Salad – from a restaurant in northern New Hampshire, this favorite salad includes: a handful of mixed greens of choice; 1 medium, cored and seeded red apple (don't peel); 1/4 cup golden raisins; about 6 walnut halves; 6 red grapes, halved; 1 scallion, diced; 1-inch cube feta cheese. Place greens on a plate, top with fruits and nuts, scallions, and center the cube of feta on top; top with vinaigrette.

Poached Pear Salad - from a Vermont country Inn: a small handful of arugula (or mixed greens); 1 pear (sliced, cored and lightly poached in water and a stick of cinnamon); 6 or 8 walnut or pecan halves, candied; 2 or 3 tablespoons crumbled gorgonzola cheese; 3 tablespoons canned fried onions, warmed. Place arugula on a plate. Top with the poached pear, candied nuts, gorgonzola and fried onions; serve with vinaigrette.

Duck Confit Salad – from Royal River Grill House in Yarmouth, ME: a handful of mixed greens; 1/2 cup shredded duck confit; 1/4 cup dried cranberries; 5 or 6 walnut or pecan halves; 1/2 of a small apple, seeded and thinly sliced (no need to peel); 1/4 cup freshly grated cheddar cheese. Note: if duck confit is not available, use shredded or sliced smoked turkey

Maple Mustard Vinaigrette – in a jar or food processor, combine ingredients, in the order given.

Ingredients: 4 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/2 teaspoon Dijon mustard, salt and pepper to taste, 2-3 teaspoons pure maple syrup and 3/4 cup olive oil. Shake or process well; serve at room

Chicken Like Luigi

A beloved friend always ordered this dish when we ate together at Sunflowers in Jaffrey, so I came up with this recipe for her. The popular cafe closed in 2022.

Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup sun dried tomatoes (not oil packed)
- 1 (8 oz.) package frozen chopped spinach, thawed and well-drained

1 cup ricotta cheese

- tender and translucent; add flour and 2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese, grated
 - 4 whole chicken breasts, boned and skinned 1/2 cup Italian seasoned bread crumbs

Supreme Sauce:

2 tablespoons butter

salt and pepper

1 teaspoon dried Italian seasoning

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Place sun-dried tomatoes in small bowl, cover with boiling water, and let stand for about 30 minutes. In a bowl, combine spinach, sun dried tomatoes, ricotta, and Parmesan cheese. Divide chicken breasts in half (you'll have eight pieces). On one half of each chicken breast, place one quarter cup spinach mixture. Cover with the other piece of chicken; repeat so you have four total stuffed breasts. Dip each stuffed chicken piece on both sides into bread crumbs, coating well. Place on a greased cookie sheet and bake 50 minutes to one hour.

Serve with Supreme Sauce: heat butter in a saucepan over low heat until melted. Blend in flour, salt, and pepper and Italian seasoning. Cook over low-heat stirring constantly, until smooth and bubbly. Stir in milk or broth. Heat to boiling, stirring constantly and adding a bit more milk if too thick. Then reduce to simmer, season with salt and pepper; pass to be served warm over the chicken.


