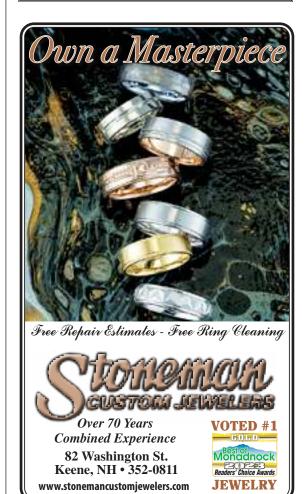

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7 Cardinal Rules Of Life For The Family To Live By

Life developed by motivational speaker and author praise their successes, and celebrate their victories. Stephen Covey. These rules are all thought-provoking and very practical.

Rule #1 – Make peace with your past so that it won't disturb your present. Could you imagine the weight of carrying around your actions of the past? Think of yourself when you were a child, or a 20-something, or a 30-something. We are not those people anymore. Our experiences have changed us and helped us grow into who we are now. Even our beliefs have changed. So, teach your children to let go of that tiff they had with a friend, the bad grade they got that one time, or that ball they dropped that lost his or her team the game. That was a moment in time that they had learned from and shouldn't relive over and over.

Rule #2 – What other people think of you is none of your business. When I first read this, I had to read it again (and probably again) to consider its meaning. I relate this to people-pleasers, who focus on getting someone's approval. When they don't get this approval, they feel as if they did something wrong or they aren't liked. But what's important overall is what you think of yourself. People's opinions of you shouldn't control you. Parents can help their children learn to value themselves in many different ways. Praise their efforts, avoid being critical, focus on their strengths, be a good role model, and encourage healthy friendships.

Rule #3 - Time heals almost everything. Give it time. This rule seems to me to be about patience: patience to not rush the wounds – they will heal in their own time – patience to let our hearts mend, and patience to allow our minds to let go. Some things just take time. Share this with your children. And when that time of healing finally sneaks up on them, there might be scars. But these scars are an explanation of why they are like they are and who they are now. They force us to be stronger.

Rule #4 – No one is in charge of your happiness except for you. As parents, you try to encourage and motivate your children. But you have no control over their emotions, their reactions, or their happiness. We adults tend to put our happiness aside and prioritize everyone else's. You think you are doing the right thing, but when your happiness is put on the back burner, sometimes it stays there! Instead, show your children that you put yourself on the front burner. Have them see you taking time for yourself. You'll appreciate others more, feel more at peace, and be more content.

Rule #5 – Avoid comparing your life to others and judging others. This rule is a mighty one. Our lives are all different. We all have different journeys that we are taking, and you have no idea what the other person's journey is all about. And more than likely, if you knew someone else's problems, you wouldn't feel as bad about your own. Teach children to not compare themselves to others, but to be happy for their

Rule #6 - Stop overthinking. Don't dwell on or worry about the same thing over and over. Our worries could very well make us ineffective when it comes to making decisions or taking action. Overthinking can lead to depression and anxiety. For children who worry, try the 333 Rule for Anxiety. According to www.healthline.com, this is an informal technique for coping with anxiety. The 3-3-3 Rule for Anxiety: name three things you see, identify three sounds you hear, and move or touch three things like your limbs or external objects. This is supposed to help not only calm the person in that moment but help ground them.

Rule #7 – Smile; you don't own all the problems in the world. Smiling is easy, free, and makes you feel good! It is also very contagious. And in the hard last four years that we've had, there isn't a more important time to give a warm smile. It's like a secret communication between strangers. You smile, they smile. And this upward curve on your face just might take on a chain reaction of smiles. Wouldn't it be great to have an entire day, week, even a year where everybody just smiled!?

How great it would be to tailor these seven rules of life to our own lives. And, what if our children learned these rules of life early on? Less frustration. Less anxiety. Less overthinking. Less unhappiness.

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Last Coal Plants In New England To Voluntarily **Making Authentic Friendships** Informal Gathering Tuesdays And Saturdays Close, Transitioning To Renewable Energy Parks

"Authentic friendships are the missing link to our culture's loneliness, says Philip Sherrick, Jr., Lieutenant Commander US Navy Retired. Granite Shore Power announced recently a historic agreement with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in which the parties have set a firm date for the voluntary closure by GSP of operations at Merrimack Station, New England's last remaining coal-fired power plant, as well as Schiller Station.

This agreement will facilitate the creation of firstof-their-kind "Renewable Energy Parks" in the state of New Hampshire.

GSP's decision to set a firm closure date for coalfired operations at both Merrimack and Schiller is part of the company's long-standing repowering plan, according to a news release from Granite Shore Power.

'From our earliest days as owners and operators, we have been crystal clear; while our power occasionally is still on during New England's warmest days and coldest nights, we were firmly committed to transitioning our facilities away from coal and into a newer, cleaner energy future. By pursuing and ultimately entering into this voluntary agreement with the U.S. EPA, we are keeping that commitment," said

Jim Andrews, CEO of Granite Shore Power. The Conservation Law Foundation called it a vic-

tory for health, clean air and water, and the climate. "The end of coal in New Hampshire, and for the New England region as a whole, is now certain and in sight," said Tom Irwin, Vice President Conservation

Law Foundation in New Hampshire. 'Now we must vigorously push for the phase-out of other polluting fuels like oil and gas. New England is positioned to be a leader in building a future where our energy comes from 100 percent clean sources, and





fossil fuels no longer pollute the climate and threaten the health of our communities."

Merrimack Station will cease operation of its coal-fired boilers by June 1, 2028, or under certain circumstances, June 1, 2027. Schiller will not operate its coal-fired boilers after December 31, 2025.

Two decades ago, a fifth of New England's electricity came from coal, the dirtiest of fossil fuels. Through lawsuits, market-based strategies, and public protests, CLF has worked to shutter aging, polluting coal plants across the region and end New England's reliance on coal, the CLF release said.

Granite Shore Power said as part of the redevelopment plan, Schiller Station is advancing a battery energy storage system, taking energy from the grid during low demand and putting it back on the grid during peak periods. Schiller is on the Seacoast and will be integral in supporting reliability daily during peak hours and storage for the wind power that is now being built off the coast of Martha's Vineyard and in the Gulf of Maine.

"The New Hampshire Seacoast is an area of high-energy demand and through the repowering of Schiller Station, we will provide carbon neutral power to support the businesses and families of New Hampshire. Our facilities are ideally situated near the infrastructure necessary to transition the region to the next generation of energy resources," stated Andrews.

Through the enactment of the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) in Washington D.C. and the continued shift toward a more electrified economy in New England, developing on-demand generation resources has become more critical than ever to ensure electric reliability for New Englanders. With the continued support of state, federal and local leaders, the redevelopment of both Merrimack and Schiller will enhance the interconnection utilization at the facilities and advance the region's overall generation mix.

"This Agreement is a significant accomplishment in driving clean energy forward, and it took a rejection of rhetoric, a focus on facts and a commitment to shared objectives. We thank U.S. EPA for their leadership and partnership over the past six years and look forward to continuing to work collaboratively to deliver reliable, clean energy for New England," Andrews concluded.

The settlement agreement signed Wednesday resolves both a lawsuit brought by CLF and the Sierra Club under the Clean Water Act, currently pending before the First Circuit Court of Appeals, and advocacy by CLF and the Sierra Club blocking Clean Water Act permits for the two facilities.

This historic victory is a testament to the strength and resolve of those who never wavered in the fight for their communities and future," said Ben Jealous, Sierra Club Executive Director. "The people of New Hampshire and all of New England will soon breathe cleaner air and drink safer water, and I'm incredibly proud to see the region continue to grow as a leader in the clean energy transition."



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The Value Of Noticing Glimmers

We are often asked how to practice mindfulness during the day. One practice, interestingly, is from a person who is not a mindfulness teacher. Deb Dana, who writes primarily about polyvagal theory, coined the term "glimmer." She writes: "Glimmers refer to small moments when our biology is in a place of connection or regulation, which cues our nervous system to feel safe or calm. We're not talking about big expansive experiences of joy or safety or connection. These are micro moments that begin to shape our system in very gentle ways."

Some examples of glimmers include: petting an ani-mal, gently rocking your body or wrapping yourself in a soft blanket, humming, savoring some delicious food or a hot cup of a favorite beverage, gardening, listening to a favorite song, feeling the warmth of the sun on your skin, receiving or giving a hug, stopping to notice the shape of trees or flowers in bloom, listening to the birds singing, looking at a photograph of someone

you love, or watching a child laugh or a puppy frolic. Savoring glimmers bring moments of calmness, joy, and peace. If we pay attention, we'll see that glimmers are everywhere.



Here are examples of glimmer moments from mindfulness teachers:

• Bringing mindfulness to something you do every day. I was in the Peace Corps in Nepal and there was no running water in my village, which was cold in the winter. Over 40 years later, I enjoy my showers and feel gratitude that I have this regular pleasure.

• I savor my morning cup of coffee, especially in the cold weather when I wrap my hands around the warm cup.

• Choosing passwords that make you smile, for example, Breathe123. My favorite password was Yogibooboo22. It never failed to bring a smile to my face.

• Wearing a bracelet, necklace, ring, or something in your pocket that reminds you to breathe or smile

• Taking a moment to look out the window and feel the gratitude and joy in simply being

Keeping a gratitude journal to note what you are grateful for.

 Practicing small acts of generosity: opening a door for someone, letting someone go ahead of you in a line, asking a clerk how their day is going, and many more possibilities.

When I take my daily medications because of my aortic dissection three years ago, I feel gratitude that I survived. This was especially true when I held my latest grandchild in my arms!

 Looking at good news websites. Simply Google the title to browse the website: Daily Good, Karuna News, Reasons to be Cheerful, Good News Network, Nice News.

Every day I make the intention to pause about 10 times a day to ask and respond to two questions: 1. Where am I? Am I here or in the future or in the past or somewhere else, maybe the Bahamas? 2. How am I? I take a few seconds to register points of tension or discomfort, for example, eyes, facial muscles, tongue, jaw, shoulders, back, etc. I take a few seconds to register emotions that are present and their strength or intensity. These pauses take less than 30 seconds. Almost always they bring me to a state of gratitude for what I have and wanting to share what I can with others.

It is so easy to feel despair in these times, whether you get your news from the newspaper or on the web. Deb Dana says that there is research that we can change our nervous system by noticing glimmers more often, as little as 10 times a day. Of course, we start small, one glimmer at a time.

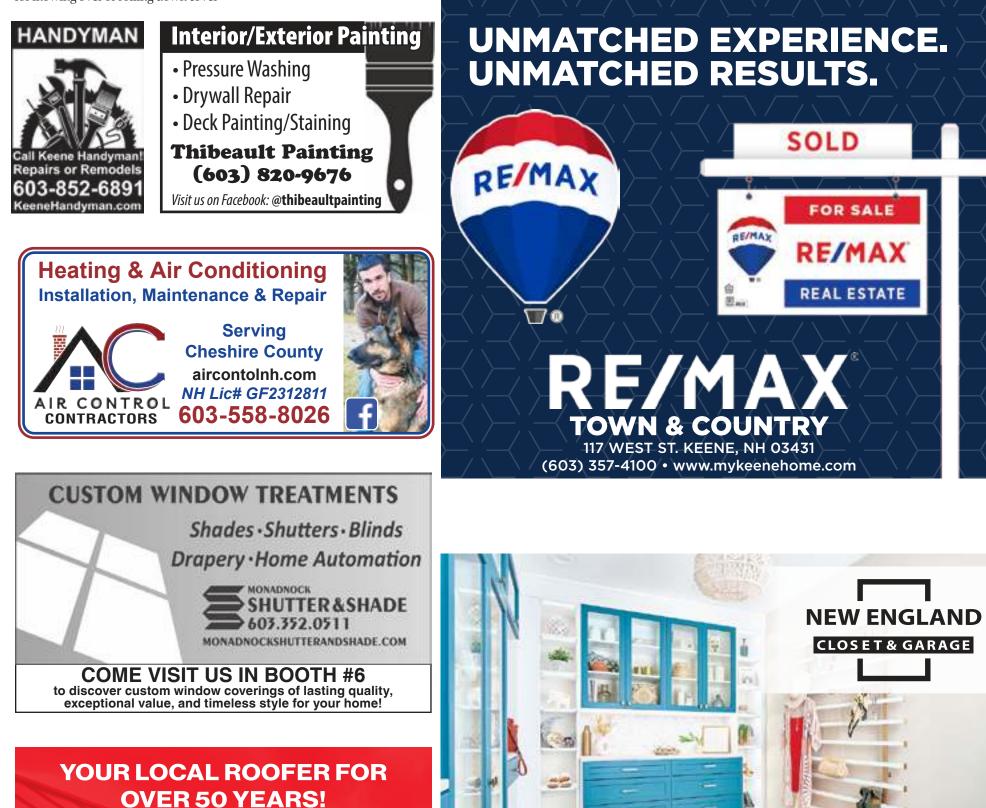

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the horses! (Of course, we had to use our own cash, earmarked to fix the rotting foundation of our house,

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Not long ago, we applied for a Climate Resilience to buy the horses. But hey, maybe the house will keep standing for a long time yet.)

We've been looking for horses for a while, and we had several leads on available teams. I was hoping for a short stocky mild team, exactly like the horses we have now, whereas my fellow was open to any kind of horses, as long as they were well-trained and could do the field work.

After two disappointing horse trips, my fellow went up to northern Maine, to visit three teams, car-Alas, we did not get the grant. But we still got riage horses in Acadia National Park. It was supposed to be a two-day trip, with a knowledgeable horse teamster going along, while I stayed home to watch the greenhouse and our four horses.

But my fellow kept sending me email messages: Staying another night, so I can truck one team of horses from northern Maine to join the other two more southerly teams. Staying another night, so I don't arrive home with new horses at midnight. Staying another night, because the truck sputtered and quit on the highway, and I want to get it fixed before I've got a trailer full of horses.



Also he wrote: I'm thinking of buying the smallest team of the lot. What do you think?

Sure! I emailed back, and then I went to tell our four horses in their winter paddock about the nice small team, coming home soon. But when my fellow finally arrived on Monday afternoon with the horses, they looked mighty big. "They're really tall," I said doubtfully. "I mean

they're beautiful. But they're really tall." "They're really nice," said my fellow. "So nice, you'll think they're short." "Oh, golly," I said, "These were the smallest

ones?"

"They're leggy, but look at their little feet. The other teams had giant dinner plate feet."

"Oh, golly," I said.

"They're your favorite color," my fellow added, which was true. I love a bay horse, a rich red-brown coat with black points: mane, tail, ear edges, and lower legs. I like to call a bay horse "a horse-colored horse.

"They're probably sister and brother, a mare and a gelding, seven and eight years old." My fellow kept talking, as we moved our four horses from the paddock to the pasture. Our four were so ecstatic about going out on grass a month early that they didn't even worry about the full horse trailer in the driveway. Of course, there wasn't really much grass, and we gave them hay, but even the idea of grass is highly exciting. Plus it meant we could put the new horses in the paddock to get them used to things around the barn, without the fireworks of introducing everyone.

The new horses came off the trailer beautifully. They looked around curiously, and followed nicely up the driveway, while our four lined up at the pasture gate in astonishment and then went bucking and galloping away. The new horses were curious, but calm. They both started eating hay in the paddock, always a good sign of a relaxed horse.

I went over to the team. "I can hardly reach your backs," I said to them, as the horses sniffed me in a friendly way.

"See?" said my fellow. "See how nice they are?"

"Fern and Willow," I said. "Is that true? Are you so very nice? I think you must be. Welcome to your new home!"

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Condiments are like old friends - highly it is nice and creamy looking. Very thought of, but often taken for granted -Marilyn Kaytor

By most definitions, a condiment is something that is added to food, usually after cooking, to provide a certain flavor and complement the dish. For many of us, condiments are what often "make the meal" – from spicing up burgers and hotdogs to enhancing ice cream sundaes and milkshakes. My own definition of condiments includes not only those items added to food after cooking, but also items like sauces, vinegars, relishes, and some dairy products, used in cooking to boost flavors. But whether we prefer our condiments as add-ons or ingredients, we can nearly all agree on our love for them. A recent survey showed that Americans annually spend nearly half a billion dollars for just the most popular condiments such as ketchup, mustard, and pickles, etc. So enjoy using condiments freely, as your heart desires! You might even enjoy trying your hand at making some of your own, using this week's easy homemade recipes for condiments.

slowly, start to dribble in 1/2 cup of mild flavored olive oil (or avocado oil), going slow and adding a few drops at a time, whisking until incorporated with the fork, and making sure each drop is incorporated before adding the next drops. Once the mayo starts to thicken, add remaining olive oil in a very slow stream, while whisking continually, until completely incorporated.

Finish the mayonnaise with the following seasonings, or enjoy it plain: 1/2 to 1 teaspoon lemon juice, a pinch of kosher salt, and 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard.

A Simple Mustard

Homemade mustard is basically combination of mustard seeds, dry mustard, and a liquid. Yet it is a condiment of many variations, with many faces – some smooth, others biting and coarse. Liquid used is sometimes water, but often vinegar, beer, or even fruit juices are used to moisten the seeds. When choosing seeds, remember that yellow mustard seeds are the mildest, black the hottest. Mustard keeps well refrigerated six months

or more. Ingredients:

6 tablespoons mustard seeds

1/2 cup mustard powder 1/2 cup water or beer 3 tablespoons vinegar, cider vinegar (or other variety of choice)

Homemade Ketchup 1 teaspoon salt Homemade ketchup doesn't really 1 teaspoon ground turmeric (optional) 2 tablespoons honey (optional)

1/4 cup minced fresh herbs (optional) Grind the whole mustard seeds for a few seconds in a spice or coffee grinder, or by hand with a mortar and pestle. You want them mostly coarse because you are using mustard powder, too. Pour the semi-ground seeds into a bowl and add the salt and mustard powder. If using, add one or more of the optional

ingredients now. Pour in the water or beer, then stir well. When it's all incorporated, let it sit for up to 10 minutes; the longer it sits, the mellower the mustard will be. When you're ready, pour in the vinegar. Store mustard in a glass jar in the fridge. It will be runny at first, but don't worry, it will thicken up overnight. Wait at least 12 hours before using.

Teriyaki Sauce

A favorite sweet-soy flavor associated with Japanese food, this condiment is useful for enhancing many meals from slow-cooked ribs and pork to stir-fries and fish skillet dishes. Make your own sauce with just five ingredients: In a bowl, whisk together 1/4 cup each sake, mirin, soy sauce, and oyster sauce; add 1 tablespoon sugar and whisk until it dissolves. Store sauce in fridge up to two weeks. Makes 1 cup.

Sweet-Sour BBO Sauce

Mix up this sauce when you need it, and not in advance. Use it to baste

The Art Gallery is the brainchild of area artist Wendi Hulslander. Her background at Jordan's Furniture in Nashua and Massachusetts combined with her talent as a painter of colorful acrylic art gave her the idea of approaching the management of Syd's Carpet and Snooze Room to permit members of the the Monadnock Area Artists Association to hang their artwork above the furnishings on the walls. Community Volunteer Transportation Company Wants To Eliminate The Words "No Driver Available"

By offering "no-fee" transportation for those without access, CVTC's team of staff and volunteers positively impact their communities in three primary ways.

• Serving neighbors in need of transportation by providing rides to non-emergency medical or social service appointments and to the grocery store, bank, post office, or pharmacy.

 Serving neighbors looking for meaningful ways to make a difference by providing volunteer opportunities and supporting our volunteer drivers with training and orientation, an easyto-use ride coordination system, and mileage reimbursement.

 Šerving the public health by partnering with local hospitals, human services agencies, and municipalities to support the health, safety, and wellbeing of our communities

April is Global Volunteer Month and the week of April 21st-27th is National Volunteer Week. The 2024 theme is "Celebrate Service." CVTC will be highlighting, thanking, and celebrating its Volunteer Drivers through various activities. "CVTC would not be in business if it were not for our volunteers," says Robin Christopherson, Community Engagement Coordinator.

CVTC has two events sponsored by The Grove Restaurant at The Woodbound Inn in Rindge on April 17th and 24th. A special \$15 per plate buffet will be available from 5 to 8 p.m. and \$3 will go to CVTC for each plate sold. Details are on their website, www.cvtc-nh.org

Currently, 65 volunteer drivers are serving over 300 people needing multiple rides within the region and up to two hours away. Drivers select rides that match their availability using CVTC's online scheduling tool. They

ceive daily email communication about open rides and relevant information. Jim Mason, volunteer driver, says,

Being a part of the CVTC volunteer transportation program is a perfect way for me to give back to my community. I like to drive and it's been a pleasure to meet and talk with the riders."

To ensure that CVTC has an adequate driver pool to meet the need, they have set a goal of 100 drivers by the end of 2024. This means the organization needs to recruit another 35 drivers. Avery says, "We want to make sure our service is widely known in the Monadnock region and get closer to meeting the unmet need. When rides are canceled because of 'no driver available' (NDA), we give the rider 48 hours' notice. This is so they can make arrangements with family or friends to provide the ride, reschedule the medical appointment, or a food shopping trip. Last year, unmet need (when no driver was available) was 14.8 percent of all booked trips (868 NDA trips /5878 booked trips).

Avery explains that, "The unmet need can only be reduced two ways: to reduce the number of rides a rider can book. The current limit is two rides a week, or increase the number of active volunteer drivers. Our preference is to increase the active pool of drivers. Currently, an average of 48 out of 65 are driving per month. Because volunteers can select trips on their availability, some are away on vacation, rehabbing from surgery, or other commitments that keep them from driving. Ideally, we need 60 to 70 volunteers driving each month and a pool of 100 volunteer drivers."

CVTC was recognized as the 2020 Nonprofit of the Year by the Greater Peterborough Chamber of Commerce. Other awards have been the 2017 Healthy Community Impact Award

from Harvard Pilgrim Health Care, and also in 2017, the Outstanding Volunteer Service Award from Volunteer NH.
