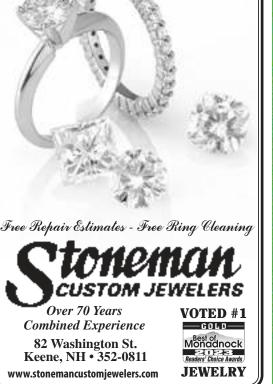

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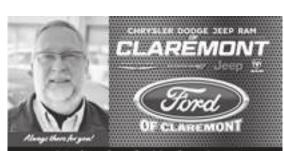


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"Dublin Does Da Blues" Concert April 19th

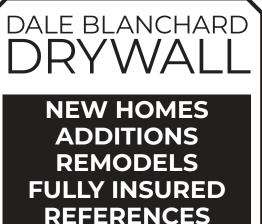

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Flying Cars Are Coming! Here's How They Could Change The Way You Travel

If you'd told me a few weeks ago that flying cars will change the way we travel, I probably would have laughed at you.

But when Elon Musk hinted there might be a flying Tesla soon, the internet started buzzing with flying car news. And now people are talking.

'There's absolutely a sense that the time has come," says aviation industry investment banker Joey Smith at Cassel Salpeter & Co. "Numerous well-funded companies are racing to build a viable production vehicle, and they could take to the skies as early as next year.

What's more, attitudes toward Advanced Air Mobility (AAM) – that's a fancy term for flying cars and other personal flying vehicles - have shifted. A new study suggests Americans, and particularly younger urban consumers, are warming to the idea of flying to their next destination. Even so, the definition of a flying car is a little hard to pin down. I'll explain in a minute.

Don't expect to open your window and see a scene out of a sci-fi movie anytime soon. (You know, lanes of flying vehicles lining the sky.) It'll be a slow travel like we haven't seen since the introduction of the jet engine.

What kind of flying vehicles are out there?

Personal flying vehicles defy simple classification, and VTOLs, quadcopters, octocopters and hexacopters. Some are electric, some are gas-powered.

Don't be confused by all the acronyms. I think it's okay to just call them flying cars.

Right now, the ones generating the most noise are electric vertical takeoff and landing vehicles (eVTOLs). These aircraft take off and land like a helicopter. For example, Joby's air taxi service in Manhattan plans to use its eVTOL, which looks like an oversized drone, to shuttle passengers from New York to JFK Airport next year.

My categorization is a little unconventional, but here's how I see it: There are really two types of flying cars. The first are cars that can drive on the road and fly, just like the ones in Back to the Future.

One of the most high-profile of these is the Model A being developed by Alef Aeronautics. It's an eV-TOL that looks like a sports car. But once it takes off, the passenger cabin pivots and the vehicle flies sideways, which looks a little jarring but very cool.

The second type of flying vehicle doesn't even bother with the road. For example, the Lilium Jet is both a fixed-wing aircraft and an eVTOL. But you won't see it on the highway unless it's making an emergency landing – so technically, it's not a flying car.

Like I said, these flying vehicles aren't easy to categorize. And it hasn't really mattered until now, because you could only find them in aviation magazines and science fiction movies. But now there are serious discussions about flying cars, and developers have started taking orders. The future is almost here. Flying cars aren't cleared for takeoff – yet

Don't get too excited. A few things still have to be worked out. For example, eVTOL manufacturers have struggled with several challenges. It's not just how to design lightweight aircraft made from the right composite materials and with adequate battery life. It's also piloting the flying car. Issues such as



autonomous flight capability and pilot training have proven to be big barriers.

There are also regulatory roadblocks. The Federal Aviation Administration, which has oversight of these new vehicles, has adopted a "crawl-walk-run" approach. And it's still in "crawl" mode. Last year, it laid down some rules for flying cars. Among them: they have to use existing heliports and they must have a human pilot. But there are no special traffic lanes in the sky for these vehicles yet.

The UK is also preparing for flying cars. In March, the government said it envisioned eVTOLs taking to the skies within four years.

Observers are skeptical of the proposed timeline. Charles Leocha, president of the consumer group Travelers United, has worked on regulations for lowlevel unmanned aerial vehicles for the last decade. He says the wheels are turning slowly.

"The FAA is at least a decade away from allowing or approving any kind of flying car," he adds.

All of that has made people reluctant to order a flying car - if they can afford one. Most vehicles range from \$150,000 to as much as \$10 million.

"Prospective buyers are likely to hold off until rollout, but it has the potential to change the way we regulatory barriers are dismantled," says Francesco Cerroni, a mobility expert at the design firm Buro Happold.

Where to find personal flying vehicles now

If you want to see a flying vehicle for yourself, which may be part of their allure. There are STOLs here's where to find them (outside of the movie theater):

Lift Aircraft, which manufactures a single-seat eVTOL called Hexa, is offering test flights on its single-seat Hexa this spring. It's scheduled to be in Lakeland Linder International Airport in Florida in April and Austin in May.

Early next year, you'll be able to hail an air taxi from Abu Dhabi and Dubai on a four-passenger Midnight aircraft. The eVTOL, operated by UAEbased Falcon Aviation, will cover the 81-mile trip in just 30 minutes. By road, the drive can take a few hours in traffic.

There's even a flying car driving school. Netherlands auto manufacturer PAL-V will show you the ins and outs of flying a car. They even have a flying car showroom in Munich where you can buy your own gyroplane/car combination. (It'll cost you about \$550,000.)

Bottom line: Flying cars remain rare. But change is on the horizon.

How flying cars could change the way we travel High prices and continued doubts about the viability of zipping around town like George Jetson haven't stopped people from thinking about the future. Experts seem to agree that safe VTOLs with FAA approval could change travel forever.

"It would reduce congestion by removing some traffic on the road and create a new aviation sector, with new jobs," says Raj Rajkumar, professor of computer engineering at Carnegie Mellon University.

Flying cars could dramatically cut the drive time between destinations typically served by short-haul commercial flights. So instead of catching a shuttle flight from Washington to New York, you'd just fly there in your own car in a fraction of the time it used to take to drive.

But that's just the beginning. As these vehicles become faster and more affordable, they hold the promise of competing with commercial aviation. Imagine flying your family car from the suburbs of an East Coast city to Florida for your next vacation in less time than it would take you to go to the airport, get through security, wait for your departure, fly, land, collect your luggage and rent an earthbound car?

The thought of ditching airlines, with their awful customer service and addictive loyalty programs, may be the greatest promise of the AAV revolution.

If you'd asked me a few weeks ago if such a future was possible, I would have been very skeptical. Now,

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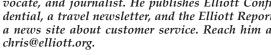

Don't forget we have a neck - connecting the brain and whole body! Brain health absolutely depends on body health. Everything that impacts the rest of our body impacts our mental health.

Many people benefit from standard care treatments including medications and psychotherapy. Others don't. Perhaps they don't tolerate the medications, experiencing distressing side effects. Or they feel as if something is still missing, as if they are stuck, not feeling better despite the treatments.

Integrative medicine enriches our treatment options to engage our natural rhythms and hormones, nutrition, detoxification, digestive health, supplements, herbal medicine, somatics and bodywork, exercise, mind body practices, spirituality, and more.

There are many contributors to mental health challenges including psychological and physical.

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childhood experiences, social struggles like violence, poverty, and racism, and the pace of modern life. All are demanding and depleting of the energies needed for healing. In truth, all our body systems - digestive, hormonal, immune, and nervous - are impacted. Everything is connected. That's the idea of Psychoneuro-endocrine-immunology - quite a mouthful!

When we don't include an understanding of the physical body aspects of mental health or if prescrip-



tions are discontinued, the symptoms may still be there. And we know that long-term use of medications can be problematic, including the possibility of a medication withdrawal process. Integrative medicine can help decrease the likelihood of those problems. Ideally, we want to help the mind and the body heal together, at the level of root causes.

Food intolerances and sensitivities, gut health, genetic and metabolic alterations, and hormonal balances can be among contributing root causes, not addressed by antidepressants or other psychiatric medications. In fact, research is showing that we can improve the efficacy of medications if we assess for and treat nutritional insufficiencies.

Did you know that low levels of certain key nutrients - B12 and folate, Vitamin D, essential fatty acids, amino acids, magnesium, and more – all can play a surprisingly significant role in our mental health? We need these nutrients to manufacture serotonin, dopamine, and other essential neurotransmitters for brain health. Testing for and treating nutrient insufficiencies can be a key part of treatment best not overlooked.

When emotional, psychological, and traumatically painful experiences result in ongoing mental health struggles, there can be physical changes in the body that change the way our brain and other body systems function. Our stress response system shifts – a chain of reactions involving neurotransmitters, hormones, and other body systems - impacting the whole body.

While we work with our thoughts and emotions in recovery, we can also work with our body using a holistic integrative approach. We can help undo the damage that chronic illness, stress, and trauma can cause, to uplift our mental and physical health.

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Keyhole Gardens



Composting is a fantastic way to give your food scraps new life. Many traditional methods involve long term tilling and turning, and the compost is often kept far from the growing space.

This can pose a problem for disabled gardeners wanting to make the most of their resources. Many modular raised bed structures are either too tall or too short for people who use mobility aids.

South African farmers, are designed for the disabled and compost from the inside out.

Using available materials, the gardens are designed as a semicircle with a path going up the middle. In the center of each garden, there is a circular compost structure. A path leads up to the compost in the center. The sides of the garden are sloped to allow for nutrients and water to flow downwards.

The concept was created to allow disabled people to do small-scale sustainable gardening at waist height. By watering through the compost chute, the nutrients are dispersed into the substrate faster than a traditional compost.

it is a fantastic way to double your gardening power in the same amount of space as a traditional rectangular raised bed.

Multiple keyhole structures can be built in a wave pattern along a line. It is recommended that each compost intake be at least six to eight feet from the next one, with plenty of sloped space in between.

Circular rows of seeds radiating from the center are recommended, using the sister planting methods developed by indigenous practices. The concept is this: Plants that hold more water in the soil are planted close to the center, and the other rows benefit from the moisture retention. Each row supports the next, creating a healthier garden environment.

Watering is done by drenching the compost in the center. This should be done less often than in a traditional raised bed. As always, use your judgment to determine if crops are thirsty. Nutrients are dissolved in short bursts and dispersed as well as broken down over the long term.

Gardening forums recommend keeping the com-Keyhole Gardens, developed in the mid 90s by post level with the soil and then emptying it out once a year and using it to top the garden. Don't underestimate online forums as information resources. Even if the forum is no longer active, it can still contain a library of information.



Using available materials is integral to the design Large scale productions using this method are of your keyhole garden. Materials used for the central basket range from a simple chicken wire fence, to a trash can with holes drilled into it, to a specially designed compost system that can range in cost from \$35 to over \$300.

As with all gardening, be aware of the impact your materials choice will have. Polyurethane products will leach into your soil, adding microplastics to your diet unintentionally. Metal rusts, and that can add salinity and change the pH of soil to suboptimal levels.

Spring is an exciting time to begin new projects. Food costs are still on the rise. With keyhole gardening, growing food is easier than ever. Remember to share your summer bounty with neighbors and friends! Even a small gift of food can create community.

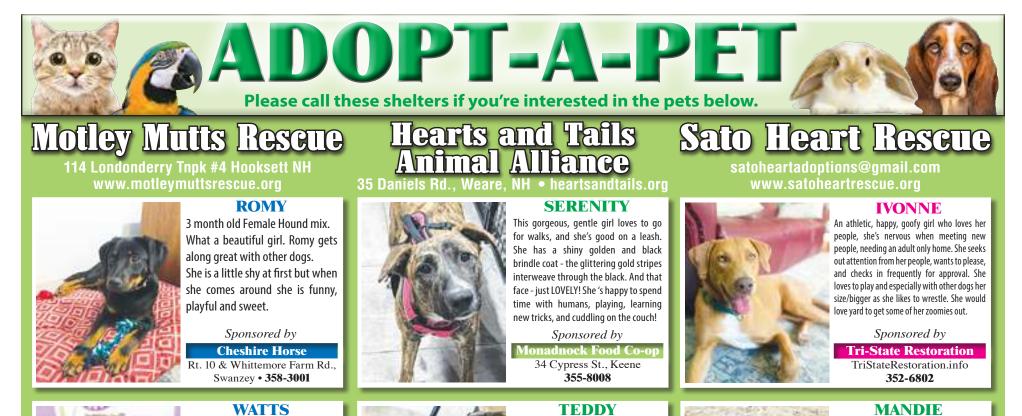

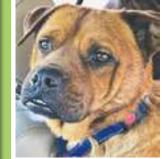

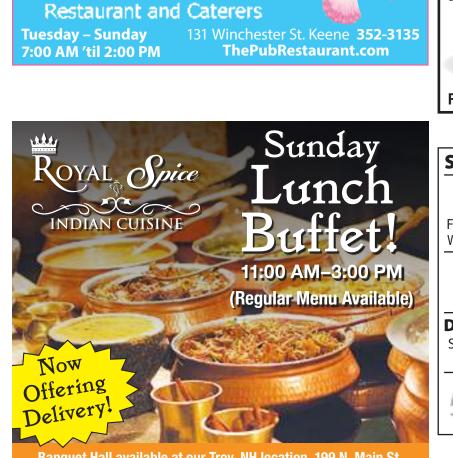

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Cooking Is A Family Affair

been cooking for a very long time, and sharing this column with you for many of those years as well. What you may not realize is that my husband and two of our sons also enjoy cooking. For my husband of nearly 67 years, it's breakfasts that he enjoys making, whether it's blueberry pancakes, oatmeal or a 'full English' with bacon or sausage, eggs, home Stir to combine and whisk in the cornstarch or flour, fries, and tomato. Son Rick prefers making dinner or supper-type meals, and his specialty is tacos. Son Jon likes to make up big batches of soup or stew for the week, that he can take to work or share in the evening with his dog. So this week, Cooking Corner shares recipes from the favorite men in my life, all of whom seem to enjoy cooking by following their intuition more than recipes.



Rick's Stir and Taste Tacos

Tacos are not just for Tuesdays anymore, in fact James Rockford of the hit TV show The Rockford Files enjoyed them the most for breakfast, quips Rick. All the toppings can be put into separate serving bowls or on a large platter ahead of time, and even the burger mixture can be reheated before placing into the taco shells. He also likes to make his own versions of hot dog tacos and breakfast tacos, both with assorted toppings.

- Ingredients:
- 1 lb. hamburger
- box of 'stand and stuff' taco shells (you can also use 6 slices cinnamon/raisin bread soft taco wraps if preferred).
- iceberg or romaine lettuce
- 1 onion
- sweet cherry tomatoes
- shredded cheese of choice
- taco sauce and/or salsa
- Spices mix up the following spices, except chipotle, in a bowl; set aside: 1 tablespoon dark chili powder; 1 tablespoon smoked paprika; pinch ground red chipotle (optional for added heat); 1 teaspoon oregano; 1 teaspoon garlic powder; 1/2 teaspoon each salt and pepper (this is a taco seasoning mix for all those cumin-haters out there) Slice lettuce into thin strips for how much you think you need for the amount of tacos you make.

Dice up one onion. Slice up tomatoes into four quarters (not dimes) for the amount you need. Pour shredded cheese into a serving bowl. Have the bowl of mixed spices handy. Preheat oven to 350 degrees and place the amount of taco shells you want on a cookie sheet but do not place in the oven yet.

Fry the burger in a skillet, breaking it up into small pieces until brown then add most of the spice mixture, reserving a pinch for the final tasting, and adding then, as desired. Important: add a little water to keep the mixture moist and slightly saucy. Reduce the heat and stir and taste; adjust the spices if needed. Now if you want, sprinkle in a little chipotle for heat and stir and taste; stir and taste some more to your desired amount of spicy heat. When satisfied, spoon some burger mixture into the taco shells, place into the oven and cook for seven minutes. When done, your family and/or friends can assemble the taco toppings to their liking and enjoy.

Ion's White Stoup

This basically starts with a soup base and gradually thickens to become more stew-like in texture, hence the name 'stoup.' Jon says he 'cheats' a little by starting with an organic pre-made base of leek and potato soup. To that he adds various white ingredients and some herbs for flavor and a bit of color. This crockpot meal makes about eight to 10 servings.

Most of you who read this column realize that I've approx. 8 oz. white mushrooms, coarsely chopped salt and white pepper to taste (or cayenne pepper for more kick)

> 1 log of goat cheese (chunks cut when serving) sprigs of rosemary and thyme for garnish (or 1/4 teaspoon dried atop each serving)

Add soup base and water to a large crockpot. stirring until dissolved. Add remaining ingredients pinch salt except goat cheese and herb garnishes; stir to combine. Cook on low heat for three to four hours. If it isn't as thick as desired, add a bit more cornstarch 1/2 teaspoon vanilla mixed with a bit of cold water to the mixture; if too thick, add a bit more water. Serve soup in bowls, each topped with a chunk of goat cheese (let it melt to creamy) and some herbs.

Jon's Coconut-Lime Rice

Jon says this is nice to serve with a stir-fry of sliced chicken, some sliced mango, red pepper and onion, all sautéed and finished with a bit of soy sauce. Ingredients:

1/2 cup water 1/2 cup coconut milk juice and zest of 1 lime

pinch salt and pepper

1/2 cup dry jasmine brown rice

Combine all ingredients except rice in a medium pan; bring to a boil. Add the rice and bring to a simmer. Stir and cover; cook 30 to 40 minutes until rice is tender. Makes one to two servings.

Husband's French Toast

While this may be made with any bread, husband 'Bud' likes to use cinnamon/raisin bread. This crispy version is made for two, but can easily be increased if desired.

Ingredients:

2 large eggs 2 tablespoons buttermilk or whole milk grated nutmeg 1/4 cup dry unseasoned bread crumbs 1/2 cup walnuts or pecans, chopped small but not too fine

butter for frying bread

In a pie tin, whisk together eggs and milk. Add some grated whole nutmeg to taste (or 1/8 teaspoon powdered); set aside. In a second pie tin, combine the bread crumbs and the chopped nuts. Dip a slice of bread into the egg/milk mixture in dish #1, then dip it into the crumb/nut mixture in dish #2; repeat for each of the slices of bread. Onto a hot griddle or fry pan, melt a tablespoon or two of butter. Fry the prepared slices of bread over medium-high heat, adjusting so they don't burn, and turning once so both sides are golden brown. Serve with maple syrup.



Bud's Blueberry Pancakes

this recipe serves two. **Ingredients:** 1/2 cup flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/3 to 1/2 cup buttermilk (adjust batter as needed) 2 eggs, separated drained, if frozen

butter for griddle Combine flour, baking powder, and salt in a bowl; add buttermilk and England cooks. Nancy welcomes vanilla. Stir to make a batter about the consistency of heavy cream. 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Techniques For Increasing Positive Behaviors

In the last two columns, I talked a lot about how to set boundaries and consequences. Now, I'd like to shift focus from setting rules and expectations to actively increasing the positive in your kids.

Children want the attention of the adults in their world, and they generally want to please those adults. Children will engage in behaviors that get them the attention they crave. This isn't kids being manipulative or demanding, it's the natural tendency to engage in behaviors that meet their needs.

First and foremost, give your children your attention. Offer it freely before your children begin to try to get it through other means. Get to know your children as individuals and celebrate their uniqueness. Show interest in the things they enjoy and engage with them in child-friendly activities. The goal is for your children to get the attention they need so they don't resort to unwanted behaviors to get your attention.

As I mentioned earlier, children will be driven to get attention, and negative attention is better than no attention. This is why focusing on correcting children when they do things that you don't like can actually serve to reinforce the behaviors that you want to discourage. Therefore, it is far more effective to focus on the behaviors you want your children to keep doing. Catch your kids being good as often as possible.

The more you praise your children for engaging in positive behaviors, the more they will want to continue to do these behaviors to get your attention and approval. It is helpful to be specific in your praise so your kids know exactly what they did that you liked. Don't wait until they do something big to offer praise. Give attention to all the little things, like telling your nine-year-old how nice it was when he played with his younger brother or picked up his toys after playing. It doesn't have to be a great success to get attention either. If you know your child worked hard on a homework assignment but still got some problems wrong, acknowledge the effort.

Another way to keep more focus on the positive behaviors is to recognize when to ignore some unwanted behaviors. If the behavior is not unsafe, and your child has learned that positive behaviors get the attention, they will be less likely to repeat the action if that behavior didn't get a response. Allowing natural consequences to occur can be more effective than telling your child to stop behaviors that they know they shouldn't do. If they are playing too rough with a toy and it breaks, they won't have that toy to play with any more.

If you see kids starting to engage in unwanted behavior, offer them an alternative activity. Distrac-

tion and redirection are wonderful tools. If you can get a child away from a potential situation where they would need to be corrected, you will have avoided the situation altogether. Keep things you don't want your child getting into out of reach and out of sight if possible. The more things your child could easily get into, the more you will need to address concerns. If the majority of the items within a young child's reach are things the child is allowed to touch and explore, then you won't need to give repeated reminders that they shouldn't touch things.

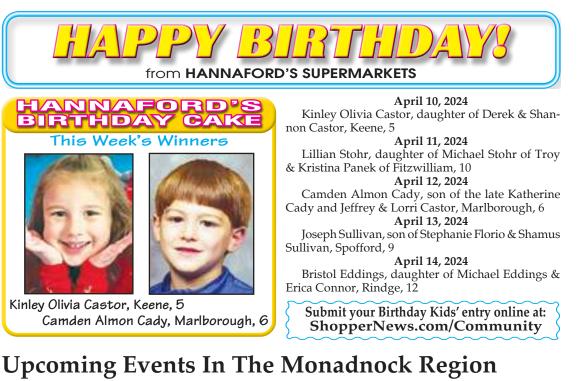


Take time to listen to your child. If you hear why your child behaved in a particular way, you can explain why the behavior was problematic while helpng your child find a way to solve what was driving the behavior. Maybe your child hit his brother in a moment of jealousy. You can not only address the fact that it isn't okay to hit, you can help your child work through appropriate responses to that emotion.

For events where you know that there will be specific behavior expected, take time ahead of the event to explain what to expect and how you want your child to behave. You can even set a reward for engaging the expected behavior. For example, your child knows to sit quietly for a particular event and when it's over, you are going out for ice cream. You have the ability to whisper a quick reminder if your child begins to get antsy.

The more you can turn negatives into positives with parenting, the more in control you will feel as a parent. Don't worry if something doesn't go as well as you had hoped. If you find yourself getting frustrated, take a short time-out to calm down and decide your next steps. Parenting isn't a one size fits all situation. Even something that worked well yesterday may not be effective today.
