



A Family Focus To Child Sexual Abuse Prevention

than we would like to believe, and April – Child Abuse Prevention Month - marks a time to bring awareness to this concerning issue.

I recently read an article that discussed prevention efforts for childhood sexual abuse. This was a study that involved interviews with adult survivors of childhood sexual abuse to explore more effective prevention efforts.

According to the National Child Traumatic Stress Network, as many as one in every four girls and one in every six boys will experience some form of sexual abuse before the age of 18. Many of these incidents are never reported due to the secretive nature of this form of abuse.

Many current prevention efforts are provided in settings such as school and focus on helping children to recognize and tell a trusted adult if they are experiencing some form of sexual abuse. But according to the study, there is some concern that this may also undermine a child's trust in adults and make it hard for them to differentiate between appropriate displays of affection and inappropriate touching behavior.

Additionally, the article indicated that most sexual abuse occurs within the context of family by someone in their home. Often, the abuser is someone who has a position of trust and/or authority within the family. This is likely to be the most prevalent and long-lasting type of abuse and the least likely to be disclosed by the child. It also has the greatest potential to disrupt the child's primary support system. This makes the message of "always telling a trusted adult" difficult and confusing, because the trusted adult may be the one harming the child. Telling may impact the child's world in ways that make the child less likely to tell.

The article suggested prevention efforts may be more effective if focused on increasing parental guardianship and promoting self-efficacy and confidence in children. The article identified six essential elements of prevention: knowledge of definitions and myths, communication, safety education, sexual development, internet safety, and facilitating disclosure.

Knowledge of definitions and myths includes teaching children the correct names for body parts and helping them understand what is and is not appropriate touching. Children who have a good concept of the names of body parts can provide clearer messaging about their experiences. This can also deter some potential perpetrators of sexual abuse because when children are able to identify body part names correctly, it suggests that caregivers are open with their children, and these children are more likely to tell about their experience. It can be confusing for

Unfortunately, child abuse is far more prevalent children to recognize abuse because it frequently happens gradually, and until a child knows that what they are experiencing is unusual, they may not understand that what is happening is abusive.

Communication can normalize talking about sensitive issues. If children become accustomed to talking about topics like body parts and "okay" versus "not okay" touches, they will feel more comfortable bringing up these topics if they have something to tell. They will know that parents are comfortable having these types of conversations. Sometimes kids don't tell because they are too embarrassed, or they don't want to upset a caregiver. Listening to what children have to say without judgement will help facilitate disclosure.



Safety education helps parents understand the value of supervision, vetting new people, monitoring, and recognizing social cues. Potential abusers engage in grooming behaviors that make a child want to spend time with them because they get special favors and attention. The parent can also experience a sense of relief at having someone who seems so good with the kids willing to step up and help. When starting to allow someone to take over some of the caretaking duties, especially ones that provide easy access like bath time, do spot checks to ensure safety.

Understand age-appropriate sexual development and behaviors and being vigilant with internet safety. It is far too easy for children to get exposed to things via the internet and to get into unsafe situations through internet connections. Parents need to be vigilant with ensuring internet safety.

Community Solar Gardens

So what is a community solar garden, anyway? When we think of a garden, we think of solar energy from the sun shining onto green cells in plants which use photosynthesis to convert CO2 in the air to carbon and oxygen. The oxygen is rejected back to the air that we breath. The carbon left behind combines with water and other nutrients from the soil to create the carbohydrates in the plant material which provides the food that we eat. Without these photons from the

sun, life as we know it would not exist.

A similar process takes place in a community solar garden, except the plant is replaced by a solar array. When the sun shines on the silicon cells in the array, in a process called photovoltaics, those photons free up electrons that flow into the electrical grid. The electricity generated then goes to power transportation, heating and cooling, manufacturing, and all the other uses that make up our daily lives. In other words, rays from the sun provide not only the food we eat and air we breathe but all the other necessities we need to survive and thrive.

That is all well and good, but where does the community fit in? With recent changes in New Hampshire regulations, a solar array built on one property can Manufacturing Company which manufactures water now serve multiple users on properties near or far. Think of the electric grid as a large reservoir. People drawing water out of that reservoir can be anywhere that the water district serves. A community solar garden works the same way.



A solar array is being built in Jaffrey on top of an old landfill that will supply 1,000 kW AC of power to the Eversource electrical grid. That is about 1.75 MWh/yr. If you are a customer within that grid, you may be eligible to receive a share of that power generated and receive all the benefits and tax incentives as if you had an array on your own roof. You can be a private resident, a business, or a church or other non-profit. Jaffrey customers are being given the first dibs on shares to the array, but there should be excess that can be offered on a first-come basis to others in the region. This is the first community solar garden in our region and we hope there will be many more.

Here's how it works: Let's say your home or small business needs 10 kW of power to supply its needs. You can sign up with the community solar garden in Jaffrey (subject to availability) for a refundable deposit of \$1000. If you are accepted, there is a share price of \$3.55/watt or \$35,500 for a 10kW share plus a one-time fee of \$2500. There is also an annual operating and maintenance cost of \$25/kW. When you apply the IRA federal tax credit of 30 percent (or the 30 to 50 percent direct pay for non-profits), that initial investment for the 10 kW share drops to

We all know that the sun doesn't shine brightly every day. We also know that there are some days


when we don't use much energy (away on vacation?). So, how does a community solar garden account for these differences? If the solar array generates more power than its users need, that excess power goes back into the grid and is sold to the utility company (Eversource in this case). Eversource credits that sale against the purchases of power by each of the users on their electric bill each month. Conversely, if the solar array produces less energy than its users need, the deficit is made up by the utility from other suppliers to the grid. On your invoice, you will see "Purchases" and "Sales" so you can see how well that array is performing each month.

The solar array will also generate Renewable Energy Credits (RECs), which are sold to companies (like energy suppliers) who want to increase their renewable energy portfolio. The money from the sale of these RECs goes back to the owners of the solar array.

With community solar gardens, you can let the sun work for you even if you don't have a suitable site for your own array.

Fun Ways To Grow Food At Home

It's spring and a terrific time to consider your focus for this year's gardening and nature experiences. May I suggest that you consider using your gardening skills to grow a bit of food? No, not the huge vegetable garden in your backyard. I and many people have had the unpleasant experience of that experiment starting out great after a whole lot of effort in the spring, and going very wrong by July. Why? Because we are busy. Period. The best of intentions does not overrule the reality of not getting around to regular weeding and feeding of a large, food garden.

So, I, Grand Poobah of Reasonable and Joyful Gardening, now grant you permission to grow vegetables and fruits in small, less intense, less expensive, and easier ways. There is great fun and playfulness to be had with growing bits of food in window boxes, in five-gallon buckets, up lattices, and along sunny fences. These options are small, already existing or easily relocated to convenient places that you see every day anyway! There are many terrific how-to guides in your library and heartfelt personal experiences on YouTube videos. Here are some of my favorites. I love these folks, they're real, and they're creative and persistent. Their YouTube and Instagram addresses are: @jamesprigioni, @Selfsufficientme, @lizzorab, @TheMillennialGardener, @raisedbedrebels, and @avellinofarms.

For beginner gardeners, I also grant you full permission to benefit from an important initial decision to grow just one or two kinds of plants in just a few or even one container. Our goal is the joy of small successes over



the despair of a huge, less than stellar, food-growing experience. How about the easiest idea ever? Go to tinyurl.com/y78a3r9t to see the Easy-Peasy Vining Vegetables Family Gardening! series of three-minute videos. This is a light-hearted, visual illustration of 10 steps to grow pea pods from a pea, as told by children in our neighborhood.

Not feeling it for growing vegetables? I get it. How about three ideas for **Edible Landscaping?**

First Option: Chain Link Grapes – Grapes growing along a chain link fence in the open sun offers multiple rewards. You and the birds get to eat lovely grapes. The grape plant's dense leaves give you privacy from whatever land use is next door.

Second Option: Berry Private Hedges – A wide variety of large, native shrubs can provide not only berries for us and our neighborhood wildlife, but also a few years after being planted six to eight feet from each other, privacy from unpleasant views. The best part of this option is that both sides of the resulting hedge benefit from the fruits of your efforts. A hedge of mixed Tall Bush Blueberries, Serviceberry, or Elderberry shrubs, for example, will create a great three-fer for years to come: berries, privacy, and ecological rewards for pollinators, birds,

Third Option: A Strawberry Lawn – It was the delight of my day to pick and share strawberries from a narrow front yard in the full sun at a previous home.

> This, maybe 10-feet deep strip of land, was located right alongside our public sidewalk. During harvest season, I was very happy to not be mowing grass, but instead weeding or laying more leaf/straw mulch when a child came by. They would, of course, ask if they could have a berry. The joy in their eyes while picking a red, ripe strawberry from my front yard highlighted my own joy of no lawn, and so many more ecological rewards for birds and wildlife.

> So, why not try one or more of these ideas for more playful joy in your garden this season? They can be a great way to balance our difficult times with daily climate actions that aren't onerous, just fun.

Kitchen Gardens Yield Fun and Food ULICK'S SUPERMARKET i



Simply put, a kitchen garden is a home garden in which vegetables and herbs may be grown to use for food. It's ideally accessible from the kitchen or a back door, to save steps when picking produce. It's small enough to be cultivated with a hand tool and just big enough to allow for a succession of plantings of greens and vegetables to be enjoyed at peak flavor. If you've never planted a garden before, it's wise to start small and increase the size as you gain experience. I've found that a kitchen garden not only during the growing season, it also lifts the spirits and adds to the pleasure and fun of cooking.

The kitchen garden is the best of all gardens

Now is the time to consider planting a kitchen garden, either in an existing space in your yard, in a raised bed or two, or in pots surrounding the patio or spot near the back door. Start with a few seeds for lettuce and other greens and perhaps some radishes. Tuck in a few favorite herbs that can be purchased already started in pots. Follow these shortly with some carrot, beet, and dill seeds. After the danger of frost is passed, set in one or two tomato plants and any other vegetables you use often. A good gardening book will give you information on how to care for the soil and answer any questions you might have about how and what to plant. This week, Cooking Corner shares some recipes for using spring vegetables and herbs in your kitchen, with the hope that you will soon have your own home-grown garden favorites to pick and enjoy.



– an old adage

1/2 cup bread crumbs

1/2 cup walnuts, pulverized

1 tablespoon fresh thyme, dill, oregano or tarragon leaves (or mix several)

1 (8 oz.) log goat cheese

2 eggs, beaten with 1 teaspoon water, salt and pepper to taste

3 tablespoons walnut oil or olive oil

1 lb. baby spinach, washed, dried and chilled vinaigrette, your own or purchased

Mix together bread crumbs, walnuts, and herbs. Slice goat cheese into one-inch thick rounds. Dip each provides fresh vegetables and herbs for daily meals round into the beaten egg mixture, then coat with the bread crumb mixture. In a medium skillet, heat oil over medium heat. Carefully brown the cheese rounds on both sides; remove them as they turn golden and drain on paper towels. Toss the spinach lightly with a vinaigrefte and place on individual salad plates. Spoon a bit of the hot pan drippings over the spinach and top each with a couple of cheese

The combination of rice vinegar and dill with young cucumbers make this a very refreshing dish that goes with nearly everything, from grilled chicken to roasted vegetables.

Ingredients:

4 medium cucumbers

1/2 red onion

1/2 cup rice wine vinegar 2 tablespoons fresh dill, minced

salt to taste

Slice cucumbers and onions as thin as possible, either with a mandolin or by hand. Place in a medium bowl and add dill. Mix well and cover; refrigerate for at least 30 minutes. Season to taste with some salt before serving. Makes four servings.

Baby Carrots And Sugar Snaps

Young carrots and sugar snap peas are combined in a rich-tasting glaze for this spring side dish. Makes four servings Ingredients:

8 oz. baby carrots

8 oz. sugar snap peas (stringed if needed)

1 teaspoon butter

1/3 cup chicken broth

1/2 teaspoon cornstarch salt and pepper to taste

Cook carrots in a saucepan of boiling water for two minutes. Add peas; cook until carrots and peas are crisp-tender, about two to three minutes longer. Drain and set aside. Melt butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add vegetables; sauté to coat. Mix broth and cornstarch in a small bowl. Add to the skillet; sauté until vegetables are heated through and liquid thickens, about one minute. Season to taste

with salt and pepper. **Grilled Baby Beets**

Colorful beets are softened over the heat of a grill, then topped with an herby, raspberry glaze. An optional smear of goat cheese finishes the dish beautifully.

Ingredients:

1/3 cup seedless raspberry jam

1 tablespoon red wine vinegar

1 tablespoon fresh thyme leaves, plus more for garnish if desired

A perfect light meal in itself, or serve it as an 1 lb. baby beets, scrubbed and trimmed as desired 1/4 teaspoon salt

4 oz. goat cheese, softened, optional

Preheat grill to medium-high. Combine jam and vinegar in microwave safe bowl. Microwave on high for 30 seconds and stir in thyme; set aside. Leave beets whole if smaller than one inch; if larger, cut into one-inch wedges. Toss beets in large bowl with oil and a bit of salt. Grill beets, turning occasionally, until slightly charred, about 10 minutes. Brush with half the raspberry glaze and continue to cook until tender, about five to 10 minutes more. Brush with remaining glaze and serve. Or, if desired, spread goat cheese on a platter and top with the beets and remaining glaze. Garnish with more thyme leaves, if desired. Serves four.

When I arrived to the Q'ero session, the initiations were still going on. Since I know Spanish, I offered to help with translation, if needed. The host asked me to assist a woman who had come from Canada for an initiation. I agreed.

The Q'ero shaman asked her for her heart stone. The woman immediately produced a beautiful, large, and obviously expensive rose quartz specimen. It was something she had surely purchased in a store. She seemed quite proud of it. In crystal healing book, rose quartz is typically cited as the ideal heart stone.

The Q'ero shaman told me, in Spanish, that what the woman had was not an appropriate heart stone. This surprised me, but I translated his comment nonetheless.

Then the shaman asked for my heart stone. I was a bit embarrassed, since he had summarily rejected hers. I showed him the greyish stone I had brought along, sheepishly. His face lit up. "That," he said, "is a heart stone. It is shaped like a heart" (which it was, actually).

Shamans and healers in many indigenous cultures around the world prefer found stones for use and practice. By this I mean stones that have either come to you, or that you have gone searching for and find on your own.


