






Moe

painting with the Pulidos will showcase their own artwork. The exhibit 'Beyond the Ordinary' is a visual testimony to the continuing momentum of the Pulidos' teachings, and the gifts they shared.

Numael and Shirley Pulido lived simple lives so they could be more free to embrace their greater quest of creating art. They lived almost 50 years in a small house in Hancock and painted, as Shirley once described "... in complete obscurity." They also taught lessons and conducted workshops in a studio behind their house. They built a following of dedicated students who were with them for a long time. The Pulidos passed away peacefully in their Hancock home, Shirley in 2020, and Numael in 2022.

Many of their students, now recognized and acclaimed artists in their own field, formed close and lasting bonds with the Pulidos and each other. Students of the Pulidos acquired much expertise in classical painting, but as Numael reflected on his thoughts about teaching, he possibly gained as much as he gave: "... to come in contact with people that you wouldn't have otherwise; with talents that you might have not approached otherwise. You learn that one of the most exciting things is to teach something to somebody, and then to see them take that and transform it in their own way, and come out with something completely unexpected that teaches me





Global Warming Threatens Maple Syrup Production

Dear EarthTalk: Woe the pancakes! Is maple syrup really at risk due to global warming?

B. Simmons, Middlebury, VT

Maple syrup, that staple of the American breakfast table, is not only a cherished product across North America, but also plays a significant role in the economies of Quebec and Vermont. This industry generates hundreds of millions of dollars yearly and supports thousands of livelihoods. But its very foundation is under threat from global warming. The disruption in the switch between cold nights and warm days of early spring, crucial for sap flow, poses a severe challenge to the industry's future.

Audubon Vermont tells how "a warming climate also presents challenges in shortening the length of the sugaring season"—a critical period for syrup production. This shift not only affects the timing but also threatens to make annual production levels unpredictable. For one, studies project that by the end of the century, the sugaring season could start up to a month earlier, with significant variability in production especially affecting regions at the southern and northern limits of maple tree ranges.

The warming climate is not just affecting the timing of sap flow, but also its quality. As maple trees undergo warmer temperatures and extended growing seasons, they consume more sugar for growth, potentially reducing the sap's sugar content. This necessitates more sap to produce the same amount of syrup, thus increasing effort and resources needed for production. Also, the changing climate may pave the way for invasive species that threaten maple trees, further complicating the challenges.

The impacts of climate change on maple syrup production are not uniform across North America. "Folks who retrieve sap from maple trees in the far Northeastern region will get a longer sap flow season while those in the Southeastern regions will see a reduction," says David Cleaves, Climate Change Advisor for the US Forest Service. This geographic shift underscores the need for flexible and adaptive management strategies to sustain the industry with the changing climate conditions.

Despite these prevalent challenges, there is hope through adaptation and innovation. Ensuring the health of maple forests and maintaining tree diversity are pivotal strategies. Innovations in sap collection technology, for example, are allowing for sap gathering at less-than-optimal temperatures, showcasing the industry's resilience and adaptability.

Beyond the challenges posed by climate change, the industry also faces threats from environmental degradation and economic factors that could further jeopardize its sustainability. Economically, the industry must contend with fluctuating market demands and the risk of cheaper, synthetic alternatives undermining traditional maple syrup. Additionally, the labor-intensive nature of sap collection and syrup production may face challenges in attracting and retaining the necessary workforce. These multifaceted threats require an innovative approach to safeguard the industry, emphasizing not only climate adaptation but also environmental conservation and economic resilience.

You might think that a baby in the spring for vegetable farmers is a little crazy. Well, we soon thought so, too. Add in a new team of horses, a new greenhouse, a new venture into CSA membership, and we went from a little crazy to a lot crazy.

Wow, we said, maybe we shouldn't do that again. But apparently the lesson is fading. Although we don't have a new greenhouse this year, and we are happy to be 20-plus years into CSA vegetable growing, with a full membership, we do have a new team of horses. The lovely Fern and Willow are adjusting nicely to the farm-horse life after the carriage-horse



We also don't have a new baby. But we do have a new puppy - and we are saying Wow again. Wow, you're cute. Wow, you get up a lot in the night. Wow, it's hard to get a lot of work done. Luckily we keep coming back to Wow, you're cute.

Our kitty does not agree. Our kitty says Wow, the puppy is not cute. The kitty says Wow, the puppy gets up a lot in the night, and I don't approve of this crate full of sleeping puppy in the bedroom. The kitty also says, Wow, it's hard to get a lot of work done: I have mice to catch, and naps to take, and necessary petting, and everywhere I turn there's a curly-haired black puppy. Wow, repeats the kitty, he really is not cute.

The horses, on the other hand, are much more interested in a puppy.

Both our old horses and our new horses find this little being fascinating, and watch him run around. Well, they would watch him run around, but mostly he is sitting a good distance away from the horses, with his eyes big. Or he is snuggled into a farmer's







The First American Cookbook

About this time of year in 1796, Amelia Simmons in mashed sweet potato and the cream just until compublished American Cookery, now recognized as the bined (don't over-beat). Gently fold in blueberries. first American cookbook, bringing together various new ingredients from Colonial America (such as pumpkin, cranberry and molasses) with English cooking traditions. In the book's introduction, Amelia referred to herself as "an American orphan" and presumably worked in domestic service somewhere in the Hudson Valley region of New York. Not only was her 47 page cookbook the first to be published in the US, it was also a testament to the determination of a working woman and a place where new ideas were born or presented. Simmons is credited with the invention of the cupcake, which she called "a slight cake to bake in small cups." Her cookbook is also one of the first to introduce the use of "pearl ash," a forerunner to what we know today as baking soda. While Simmons' book has recipes for various meats, stews, soups, and pies common to that era, its main importance was a variety of cakes, breads, and flapjacks that used familiar American ingredients such as cornmeal, milk, water, flour, and a bit of fat, cooked on a griddle or before an open fire. Herein can be seen the beginning of the story of cooking in American life.

Cooking Corner this week shares a few recipes for baked goods, with a nod of thanks to Amelia Simmons' for her pioneering efforts with the publication of American Cookery in 1796.

Add the rest of the water, flour, oil and salt; mix until you have a smooth dough. Cover the bowl with plastic and let it rise until double in size, about 40-50 minutes. Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Put the dough into well-oiled large skillet or divide into four to six small skillets; top with a little olive oil and use your fingers to flatten out the dough. Top with flaky salt and thyme. Bake until golden, about 30 to 35 minutes for the large bread and 18 to 20 minutes

Antidote To Loneliness: Breathe And Say "Hi"

zines that talk about loneliness and how it has become happen even when we are surrounded by people, so it is not just because we are alone. There seems to be an element of intimacy that is missing for us to feel lonely. If we look at all the ways we can communicate – e-mail, Facebook, texting, tweeting, Facetime, Twitter – then how can we be lonely? Connection is the key. Connecting with another human being is key to managing this epidemic called loneliness. So why not pay attention the next time you are walking down the street and take a breath and say "hi"?



Paying attention to our breath can help make us aware that we are all connected. It can slow our heart rate down and help us to listen less to the voices we carry in our heads. As we practice regularly, it can increase our focus on the breath, which can help us stabs of the losses we have accrued. This offers a to take the first step into knowing ourselves a little more. It helps us to realize that no matter how much we feel separated from others, our lives are connected in some way or another. Online networks give us a false picture of interaction that is a poor substitute for real connection to others. It seems that there is a stigma attached to loneliness and that it is safer to say one is depressed versus lonely. Covid did not

I have been reading articles in the paper and maga- on our mental wellness. We endured suffering from those we lost, and increased isolation due to our fear an epidemic in our modern world. Loneliness can of either giving or getting Covid. And we carried this fear. We never really healed from it and if we had any portion of loneliness prior, it only grew.

Meditation can help us to center ourselves. It can, as we practice more and more, allow ourselves to have these feelings surface and sit with them, without judgement. We may experience these sensations in different parts of our body. The goal is to breathe into these areas and allow ourselves to notice them. This is a time of great compassion for ourselves to be gentle, and again nonjudgemental. For us to get to the other side of grief, we need to experience what we have pushed down and buried.

Imagine what it would be like to live with a courageous heart, to not turn away, to stay open to what is difficult to face. Jack Kornfield, a deeply respected American Buddhist teacher, suggests, "We hold mindfulness of moment-by-moment arisings with vigilant stance of a mother with her baby. There is a stance of that mother, in this meaning of vigilance, a sense of holding vigil – a deep respect. In holding vigil, there is a sense of quiet and compassionate and appropriate responsiveness." A mind of vigil is a mind that is powerful enough to hold the deep sense of liberation, once we get to the other side of these deep feelings.

According to a Purdue University study, along with practicing meditation, people who made eye contact with strangers reported feeling less disconnected than those who felt as if people were looking through them. "Reaching out even in the smallest ways, can inch us closer to more meaningful relationhelp any of us with loneliness as it weighed heavily ships, which research shows can prevent much of the damage social isolation causes. Lost in our pain, we live in a universe of suffering. Witnessing our pain, we live in a universe permeated by compassion." It is our time to re-emerge into the social beings we once were. So, the next time you pass someone on the street, take a breath and say "hi". You have nothing to lose and everything to gain.
