#### Keene ArtWalk - May 31-June 9 - Worth Every Step ArtWalk Festival Is This Saturday, June 1st

Beauty is in the eye of the beholder, and the Annual Keene Art Walk guar antees beauty for every eye to behold!

For the 34th consecutive year, Downtown Keene will transform itself into an outdoor art gallery, providing an opportunity for local artists to showcase their work and connect with the greater Keene community from Friday, May 31st through Sunday, June 9th. This year, more than 100 artists will fill downtown storefront windows with creative displays featuring mediums such as oil, pastel, acrylic, photography, watercolor, fiber, mixed media, ceramics, woodturning, and most recently pyrography and digital art.

ArtWalk Director Molly Fletcher, who is also an art teacher at St. Joseph's Regional School, has been at the helm of the volunteer committee for the past three years. "Our community should be so proud of the ArtWalk and its history," she says. "This event was established nearly 35 years ago with the goal of supporting local artists and giving them a venue to publicly display their work, sometimes for the first time."

### **Smokehaus Bbq: Putting The Zing Into Wings**

Fast forward to the 1980s, when the influx of sports bars with multiple TVs took America by storm, raising the already-fervent love of chicken wings to a whole new level.

plating the idea of letting their kids stay home alone up at any time. during weekdays this summer. For some parents, this might sound unthinkable, while others not so much as they might have older children.

I was the youngest growing up, so there was always an older sibling around, and by the time I was 12, I was doing childcare. But you know your child. Is she mature enough and acts responsibly? Does she understand what to do in case of an emergency? Is there someone – a close friend or relative – that lives nearby? These are some of the questions you might ask yourself whatever your situation may be.

Your first thought as a parent making this big decision is probably "safety." Does your child have a good grasp of what to do in case of an emergency? Are they comfortable asking for help when there are troubles? Basically, can your child make good decisions? They should know where the fire blanket or fire extinguisher is kept and how to use it. They should have a phone to be able to call 911 as well as a nearby friend, relative, or neighbor. Not only have this information written down but make sure to also put these numbers into your kid's phone.

Another thing to do to ease the mind is to make sure your first-aid kit is fully equipped with Bandaids, Bactine spray, and Neosporin. Also, keep a few heating and cooling patches on hand. Go over the uses for everything in the kit. Check out www. redcross.org/get-help/how-to-prepare-for-emergencies/mobile-apps.html for a free Red Cross First Aid App for instant expert advice.

Rules need to be established from the get-go. Being safe means not using the stove or oven (unless there is an older teen with experience in the kitchen), no one else is allowed over to the house while you are out, or not opening the door to anyone. Also, let them know your expectations of their actions. Talk to them about horsing around or anything irresponsible that will get them into trouble, or someone hurt. You need to feel comfortable – your children, your rules.

During the day, have a line of communication open with your children. They should not only have your phone number but your work number as well. At first, you might want a text check-in every couple of hours until you are feeling comfortable and perhaps checking in with them at lunchtime or halfway through the day after that. If they have grandparents or aunts or uncles in the area that could drop by now and then – especially at first – that will help put your mind at ease. Because you've told your children nobody is in the house while you are out, you'll need

Answering telephone calls and being on social media have their safety issues. The one in charge should be the only one to answer the phone. He or she should know to never tell someone on the phone that their parents aren't home, but rather "busy right now." Also, if your children are allowed on social media websites, they are never to talk about being home alone or sharing information about where they are located.



Left to their own means, your kids could very well be watching television or playing games on their phones all day. So, parents will want to establish rules for screen time and which devices can be used while you are out. You could plan activities, movies, games, and food that will make it fun for your children to be on their own. You'll probably need to start with a full schedule for them to follow just so there is some kind of structure, because if boredom sets in it could possibly go downhill from there. Activities and games could include setting up a scavenger hunt, tie-dying T-shirts, making slime, or having a silly string fight

Don't forget to slip in a daily chore for each child. This not only helps the parents keep the household moving forward but also teaches the children responsibility. You can rotate the chores (take the garbage out, do the dishes, bring all the dirty clothes to the laundry room) so a child isn't doing the same thing every day. It's always nice to mix it up.

Make sure to throw in some downtime to the schedule during the day, like reading, writing in a journal, doing a puzzle, sorting through a collection anything to help them chill for a bit. A schedule might go something like this: breakfast, chores, gaming or television for an hour, craft or some kind of fun activity, go outside - the yard or driveway - to get exercise (basketball, soccer, tag), lunch, an hour of quiet time, gaming or television for an hour, board game or activity together, set the table for dinner.

The older child that is left in charge is certainly taking on a lot of responsibilities, so make sure that they know how much you appreciate their time and care. Reward them in different ways throughout the summer, like a weekend sleepover or day at the ocean with some of their friends, taking them to an outdoor concert to hear a band that they love, or giving them a gift certificate to their favorite shopping place.

It's natural for parents to worry when first leaving kids without supervision. But by being prepared for anything, staying home alone can be a positive experience for them, and you.



#### **Community Wealth Building: Transforming Local Economies**

"Amid the chaos and breakdown of our time, imagining such a thing as economic system change can seem daunting, overwhelming, impossible," said Marjorie Kelly, a distinguished senior fellow at The Democracy Collaborative. "The truth is system change is already emerging all around us. It's beginning in our own backyards, in the form of Community Wealth Building, a form of local economic development that transforms local economies through communities having direct ownership and control of their assets."



last September. Let's take a closer look at this approach.

What is Community Wealth Building?

"When 50 percent of the population can't put its hands on \$1000 in an emergency, and 50 percent of the private workforce has retirement assets of zero, wealth insecurity is a severe problem in this country, and we need a way to build wealth," said Corey Rosen, founder of the National Center for Employee Ownership.

Community Wealth Building calls for a "great ownership transition" - shifting ownership from the hands of a few to many. Who owns and controls a city or town's businesses, buildings, and other assets profoundly impacts community members' health and wealth. So, Community Wealth Building calls for broadening ownership through diverse strategies like forming cooperatives; moving money to community banks, public banks, and credit unions; cultivating land trusts; and much more. This approach also reimagines how wealth is invested to serve community needs over building billionaires. With a shift in wealth comes a shift in power.

"[While] we've built superhighways for speculative investments, productive local investments travel dirt paths," said Kelly. "We need new infrastructure to make local and impact investing easy. Much of that innovation is coming at warp speed from the impact investing world, where countless funds are springing up to invest in marginalized communities, decarbonize buildings, and advance sustainable development goals."


the music of Greg Hopkins, Count Basie, Don Sebesky, Steely Dan, and more.





#### Rebalancing Wealth: Baby Bonds

Connecticut launched America's first baby bond in 2023, depositing \$3200 in an account for each newborn enrolled in the state's Medicaid program. Over time, each account will grow to as much as \$24,000 per child. When these children reach 18, they can use this money for college, a down payment on a home, to start a business, or to save for retirement. Baby bonds represent a long-term approach to reducing the wealth gap in future generations: prosperitynow. org/baby-bonds.

The University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute offers a compelling case in support of baby bonds (bit.ly/baby-bonds-CWB), "Experts suggest that addressing equity and closing the racial wealth divide would add more than \$2 trillion in GDP annually, increasing economic development and improving the health of the economy, which is an area of common ground for political parties. In general, making equitable adjustments to existing tax subsidies that disproportionately benefit the highest-income earners could generate enough savings to pay for baby bonds."

#### **Recirculating Wealth: Anchor Institutions**

Another example of Community Wealth Building is Evergreen Cooperatives, which blends the economic power of anchor institutions with employee ownership. Anchor institutions are large non-profits that, once established, usually stay in one place – think of hospitals, universities, and government entities. By connecting the goods and services offered by locally owned businesses to the needs of anchor institutions, both the individual companies and the entire local economy benefit.

In 2008, The Cleveland Model in Ohio started Evergreen Cooperatives with an employee-owned green laundry service to meet the needs of local hospitals:

evgoh.com. Evergreen now includes four more cooperatives focusing on weatherization and manufacturing, plus an employee ownership investment fund. In our region, hospitals are coming together to explore Community Wealth Building through the Healthcare Anchor Network: healthcareanchor.network.

#### Spreading Wealth: Employee Ownership

Employee ownership, another Community Wealth Building strategy mentioned above, gives workers their own shares in the company they work for. There are multiple forms of employee ownership, from employee stock ownership plans to worker cooperatives: nceo.org/what-is-employee-ownership.

King Arthur Baking Company in Norwich, VT became 100 percent employee-owned in 2004: kingarthurbaking.com/impact. Owners Frank and Brinna Sands wanted to retire, but without family members to take over the business, they turned to their employees to keep the company's mission intact. Workers earn company stock, giving them a path toward a better retirement.

"These jobs are not going to be sent overseas when it's an employee-owned company," said King Arthur employee-owner Rosie Wawrzyniak. "That's why politicians, no matter what side of the aisle they're on, they always support employee-owned companies. You know, people really care about getting meat from happy cows or happy chickens; why would you not want products from happy people? Customers benefit when they're getting a better-quality product from happy people."

"If you have time for just one book this summer, please read Marjorie Kelly's Wealth Supremacy," shared local economist Michael Shuman. 



2) the traffic, which was impressively loud and fast, especially the truck with jig brakes that thundered by;





### Serve New England Desserts With Pride

In the category of New England desserts this week, I'll include old and new recipes for pies, cakes, and puddings served at the end of a meal or for an afternoon snack with tea or coffee. Traditionally New England desserts have embraced seasonal favorites made with local ingredients such as cream, milk, and eggs, flour or leftover bread, and whatever fruits and berries might be available - often served warm from the oven or sometimes cold, and with a pitcher of heavy cream. Perhaps your family favorites were learned at the hand of a grandmother, mother or aunt, or from a good friend or cheerful neighbor. Whatever your favorite desserts, serve them homemade and often with pride and celebration.

#### **Etched-in-Stone Peach Cobbler**

Believe it or not, this recipe for "Peach Cobbler" can be found on the gravestone of O'Neal Bogan 'Peony" Watson, in New Ebenezer Cemetery in Castor, Louisiana. O'Neal's son loves this family recipe so much that he had it inscribed on his mother's grave after she died in 2005. While not a New England recipe, it's easily made when fresh peaches are in season; or use frozen or canned peaches, well-drained. Lovely served warm with some fresh vanilla ice cream.

Recipe: (as it is printed on gravestone)

1 cup flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

2/3 cup sugar

1/2 cup butter 1/4 teaspoon salt

ripe peaches

Mix dry ingredients. Add 3/4 cup milk. Put fruit in pan. Pour on topping. Bake at 350 degrees until done.

Notes for clarification: I combined all the dry ingredients in a bowl, then cut in the 1/2 cup butter until crumbly, and then mixed in the milk to make the topping. I covered the bottom of a 9x9-inch lightly buttered pan with cut up peaches (approximately one and a half cups), then poured the topping evenly over the peaches (topping is runny, not stiff). I baked it about 30 to 35 minutes until done.



#### Blueberry 'Cream' Pie

This is not a 'cream' pie in the traditional sense. Instead, a flour-thickened cream is poured over the open-faced pie during the last 15 minutes of baking to meld with the berries. Use your own crushed cookie recipe for the pastry or a regular nine-inch pie crust.

1 nine-inch pastry shell or crushed cookie crust

6 tablespoons sugar, divided

1 quart blueberries

1 cup heavy cream

3 tablespoons flour

Roll out or prepare the crust for the nine-inch pie dish. Sprinkle two tablespoons of the sugar on the bottom, then scatter the berries over, and sprinkle with another one tablespoon sugar. Bake in preheated 425 degree oven for 12 minutes. Whisk the cream, flour and remaining sugar together, then pour over the berries. Lower the oven heat to 375 degrees and continue baking about 15 minutes until the cream is bubbly. If crust seems to be browning too much, drape foil over the edges. Remove from the oven, let pie settle and cool a bit on a rack before serving warm, with ice cream if desired.

#### **Chocolate Crater Cake**

This is a perfect cake for cookouts, picnics, and parties. It's easy to prepare (despite the long list of ingredients) and doesn't require a frosting, so it packs easily.

**Ingredients:** 

**Crater Filling:** 

3 tablespoons butter

3 tablespoons cocoa 2/3 cup powdered sugar

1 tablespoon milk

1/4 teaspoon vanilla

In small saucepan over low heat, melt butter. Add cocoa, stirring constantly until blended and smooth. In small mixing bowl, combine powdered sugar, milk and vanilla. Add the cocoa mixture; beat on high speed with electric mixer two minutes.

Cake: (12-15 servings) one recipe Crater Filling 1¾ cups flour 1½ cups sugar 2/3 cup cocoa 1½ teaspoons baking soda 1 teaspoon salt 1½ cups (12 oz.) dairy sour cream 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter, softened 2 large eggs 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/2 cup chopped nuts

powdered sugar, optional for dusting top Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour a 13x9x2-inch baking pan. Prepare crater filling and set aside. In large mixing bowl, stir together flour, sugar, cocoa, baking soda and salt. Add sour cream, butter, eggs and vanilla; blend on low speed and then beat on medium speed of electric mixer three minutes. Pour batter into prepared pan. Place one-half teaspoonfuls crater filling one-inch apart over top of batter. With fork, marble filling lightly over batter. Sprinkle nuts over top. Bake in 350 degree oven for 35 to 40 minutes, until it tests done with toothpick in cake portion near the center. Cool completely in pan on wire rack. Sprinkle powdered sugar over top if desired.

Mom's Apple Crisp

Everyone loved my mom's Apple Crisp and my recipe is so stained from use it's barely legible. This dessert is easy to make and nice topped with whipped cream

**Ingredients:** 

1 quart sliced apples (any kind or mixture)

1/4 teaspoon salt 3/4 cup flour

1 cup sugar (half maple sugar is nice if available; otherwise use all granulated sugar)

1/2 cup butter

1 teaspoon cinnamon

Place sliced apples in a buttered baking dish and sprinkle with salt. In a bowl, work together the flour, sugar, butter and cinnamon until crumbly. Spread flour mixture over apples and bake, uncovered, in preheated 375 degree oven for 40 to 45 minutes.

practice is the ability to face life with more flexibility. With practice, we can begin to listen to that small whisper that hints... maybe I can change, maybe I can soften and discover some part of my understanding attitude canceling out the humanity of I didn't know was there before.

Through meditation the warm, emotional intelligence we all have inside us can open up and become accessible. As the disturbing crises of adult life (cancer, diminished mobility, loss, isolation, change minutes, the true nature of inflexible which old habits can softly be let go in status) come up, we often feel separated from that beliefs can begin to be felt. essence. Mindfulness affirms that presence within and retains faith that it is always possible to return see that it is possible to disagree and practicing meditation for 30 years. to our essential basic goodness.

In times of crisis, the easiest thing to do is to cling to whatever we have used in the past to set things right. We tend to retract and stand our ground, relying on rigid learned habits of behavior. Those habits may or may not be helpful, but they are familiar. To ing to defend cruelty, whether deliber- therapist for over 25 years before admit that our understanding may be inadequate is to feel like the rug has been pulled out from under us. If anyone contradicts our understanding, we may feel misunderstood and lash out. Or our habit might be to cave inward and end up feeling isolated. The physical tension felt in these times can become intensely uncomfortable. And yet, we tend to double **Keene Is Offering Free** down and ignore what that tension is saying about how workable our old habits might be. In our fear Senior Health Fairs and confusion, we can become adamant about what is going on and what has to be done.



As meditation teacher Ram Dass notes, "If you want to be free more than you want to be right, you have to let go of righteousness, of being right. There's no rush. Go on being right just as long as you can. You'll see that being right is actually a tight little box that is very constraining and not much fun to live in. Righteousness cuts you off from the flow of things."

Ram Dass has had a unique experience with confronting old habits and needing to find a new flexibility in life. For decades he was a much loved teacher. Crowds flocked to hear him. After a stroke left him partially paralyzed and struggling to speak, he wrote about how his meditation practice helped him reach deep inside to find a new way of relating to his students and his teaching.

We live in an age when belief systems can turn families and friends against each other. Ram Dass goes on to say, "Just allowing your humanity and that of others to be as it is, is the beginning of compassion. We are in a human incarnation. We can't walk
