

Frank Lloyd Wright: Collection Of Dr. Charles Hamilton


The Jaffrey Civic Center will share Dr. Charles Hamilton's private collection of Frank Lloyd Wright Memorabilia. This exhibition will run August 8th through September 20th. There will be an opening reception on Friday, August 8th from 5 to 7 p.m.

Jaffrey native Hamilton (1930 – 2019) first learned about Wright in 1953 when he happened upon a televised discussion between the architect and NBC reporter Hugh Downs in which Wright expressed his desire for a new American architecture to represent democracy and freedom. Over the following 50 years, Hamilton collected books, periodicals, and articles about Wright and corresponded with Wright homeowners who shared stories and photos. As Hamilton once wrote to a friend, "My collection gives me great solace. I can now sit in my room, close my eyes, and be transported into a Wright house. I can visualize the details and even the seasonal changes."







High Summer

This is always such a busy time of year: veggies to to pickle, tomatoes to can, weeds to remove from the garden, and plants to thin - along with everything else that needs doing to keep the family running. It's a good idea to pace yourself and remember to take breaks as needed.

One thing that should not be overlooked is the weeds that are about to, or are, forming seeds. There are many plants that sprout up and flower in the spring. Remember, first come the flowers, then come the seeds. If you look at some of these weeds, they will have hundreds of seeds on them when they are ready to finish their jobs. The main job of plants is to reproduce themselves. That's why if you want a flowering plant to keep on sending out flowers, you have to pick off the ones that go by.

I regularly check all around the garden for potential seed bearers. Grasses can sometimes be the worst as they skip the flower stage and go right to producing seeds. They can be perfectly seated outside of the garden and send up a stock that reaches right in. If you can get all of the root, these weeds will be done. I like to use a fork and dig around the stalk a little bit. I then grab the plant just below the soil line and pull. Generally, the whole plant will come up.

individuals each day will save you hours of work in the years to come.

Freezing Corn

I know that I have probably written about this before. However, this is the biggest bang for the buck of everything that I do in the summer. It only takes corn six hours to go from a sugar to a starch after it is picked. That is why all the frozen corn that you buy at the store tastes nothing like fresh corn on the cob. But you can freeze it fresh and have luscious corn on the cob flavor all winter.

I go to the farmer's stand early in the morning and put in the freezer, berries to make into jam, cucumbers buy three dozen ears of corn, making sure that it was picked today. These I bring home and Bob helps me shuck them. Then I get out my steamer and boil some water in it (you can boil the corn if you don't have a steamer). I place six ears of corn in the steamer and leave them there for three minutes. Then I put them in a big bowl of ice water to cool down. Once cooled, I put them in a bowl and use a sharp knife to take the kernels off of the cob. These then go into a Ziploc bag, which I lay flat so that they will stack. It takes about three ears of corn to fill a quart bag. Once all the bags are filled, I put them in my freezer. I generally get 12 to 14 bags. And, many times, I will only use 1/4 or 1/3 of a bag for a recipe. So I get many great meals out of it.



From the time I leave the house to go to the market Taking a little time to peruse the garden for such until the bags are safely stored in the freezer, it only takes about 3 or 3 ½ hours. So much for so little! I am constantly having people thank me for sharing this idea with them.



If "tariff" isn't the word of the year, then perhaps classes and geographic regions cannot be emphasized it's "uncertainty" or even "volatility." 

Simple Summer Meals At Home

"A simple meal can be the perfect way to relax and – Ŏprah Winfrey

What to do when you're sick of take-out and crave some simple homemade meals that can be made with ease and relative simplicity? I hope this week's recipe ideas will help you prepare some simple summer meals when you're feeling 'shuffled' and out of sorts.

Bean, Tuna & Shaved Squash

A lemony dressing infuses a salad of white beans, tuna and shaved summer squash with bright flavors for a no-cook summer evening meal. Four servings. **Ingredients:**

1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons olive oil

1/4 cup fresh lemon juice

1 shallot, minced

1 tablespoon fresh thyme leaves (or 1 scant teaspoon

1 clove minced garlic

salt and black pepper to taste

1 (14 oz.) can cannellini beans, drained and rinsed 1 (6.7 oz.) jar tuna in olive oil, drained and separated

1 each small zucchini and yellow squash, thinly shaved lengthwise into ribbons

dill sprigs for garnish, optional

In large bowl, whisk together olive oil, lemon juice, shallot, thyme, garlic, salt, and pepper for the dressing. Fold in beans and tuna; let marinate at room temperature for 20 minutes. Gently fold ribbon-shaved squashes into bean mixture and let marinate at room temperature until squash softens slightly, about 20 minutes. Season with a bit more salt and pepper to taste and divide mixture among four shallow bowls to serve. Garnish with dill sprigs, if desired.

'Shrimp Boats (is a'coming, their sails are in sight....)'

When you don't want to heat up the kitchen, put on some Jo Stafford music and enjoy time in the backyard. With crusty bread and a salad, dinner is on the table with relative ease. Serves four.

Ingredients:

1 bottle or can of beer

2-3 teaspoons Cajun seasoning, to taste

1 lb. large shrimp, cleaned and peeled (or unpeeled do-your-own)

juice of 1/2 lemon

Pour beer and Cajun seasoning into a bowl. Add shrimp and marinate in refrigerator for about one hour. Remove shrimp from marinade and place on several layers of heavy duty foil. Season with lemon juice. Place another layer of foil over top and seal edges tightly. Place entire pack in a fourth sheet of foil and seal tightly. Set over medium-low coals or on a grill with medium heat. Cook eight to 15 minutes until shrimp are done (don't overcook). Unwrap carefully - steam is hot.

Sweet Potato Nachos

Some prepared foods and eggs turn this alsobreakfast dish into something everyone will love for an easy summer dinner. Makes four to six servings. **Ingredients:**

1 (20 oz.) bag frozen sweet potato waffle fries

1 lb. bulk breakfast sausage or Italian sausage, casings removed and crumbled

1 tablespoon olive oil

6 large eggs

salt and freshly ground black pepper 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese

1 avocado, thinly sliced

1/2 cup quartered cherry tomatoes

3 scallions, thinly sliced 1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley or cilantro

toppings: sour cream, hot sauce, thinly sliced ja-

lapeño

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spread fries on rimmed baking sheet and bake according to package directions. Meanwhile, cook crumbled sausage in a skillet until browned and cooked through, about five to six minutes; set aside. Wipe out skillet, add olive oil and cook the eggs three to five minutes, depending on how you like the yolks; season to taste with salt and pepper. When the fries are ready, turn the oven to broil. Top the fries with sausage and cover with the cheese. Cook under the broiler until cheese is completely melted, about two to three minutes. Remove from broiler; top nachos with cooked eggs, avocado slices, tomatoes, scallions and chopped parsley. Dollop with sour cream and other toppings as desired.

Chicken Cutlet Saltimbocca

A simple 'hack' of a well-known Italian dish that is made with chicken, flavored with sage, cheese and prosciutto. If you can't find fresh sage leaves, rub the chicken breasts with some dried sage when you season it with salt and pepper.

4 boneless, skinless thin-sliced chicken breasts salt and freshly ground black pepper

4 fresh sage leaves

4 ounces prosciutto

1 tablespoon olive oil

4 ounces provolone cheese

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Tear off four pieces of parchment paper, each slightly larger than the chicken breast slice. Place each breast on a piece of parchment, season with salt and pepper and top each with a sage leaf and slice of prosciutto. Heat oil in large ovenproof skillet over medium-high heat. Pick up each chicken breast by the parchment paper and plop it prosciutto side down into the skillet; remove/ discard the paper. Cook until prosciutto is crisp, three to four minutes. With a spatula, flip chicken breasts, then top each with a slice of cheese. Put skillet in the oven and bake until chicken is cooked through and cheese is nicely melted and bubbly, five to seven minutes. (If you want cheese to brown more, turn on the broiler one to two minutes). Makes six servings.



Oven-Baked Omelet

With a salad and bread, this makes an easy supper for four to six people. I love this recipe because it is so versatile: If desired, add cooked bacon pieces, ham or other leftover meat; or add a few greens that will wilt when cooked or small pieces of cooked vegetables. **Ingredients:**

6 large eggs

1/2 cup cottage cheese

1/2 cup sour cream

salt and black pepper to taste

1/2 cup salsa of choice

11/2 cups shredded Monterey Jack or cheddar cheese (or combination)

Spray a nine-inch pie pan with nonstick cooking spray. Whip together eggs, cottage cheese, and sour cream in a bowl; season with salt and pepper. Spread salsa over bottom of pie pan and sprinkle cheese over that. Pour egg mixture over cheese. Bake in 350 degree oven for 45 minutes.

Turkey Calzone Sandwich

Deli turkey, cheddar, bacon and apple make a delicious combination in this super-sized calzone-style sandwich for six; amounts may be doubled.

Ingredients:

1 tablespoon cornmeal

1 lb. loaf frozen pizza dough, thawed 3/4 lb. thinly sliced cooked turkey, divided

8 slices cheddar cheese

5 strips bacon, cooked and crumbled

1 small Granny Smith apple, peeled and thinly

1 large egg, beaten

1 teaspoon Italian seasoning

Sprinkle cornmeal over a lightly greased baking sheet. On a lightly floured surface, roll dough into a 15-inch circle; transfer to pan. Arrange half of the turkey over half of the dough; top with the cheese, bacon, apple, and remaining turkey. Fold dough over filling and pinch edges to seal. Cut three slashes in the top for steam release. Brush with egg, then sprinkle with Italian seasoning. Bake at 400 degrees until golden brown, 20 to 25 minutes. Let stand five minutes, then cut into six slices.

Maurice Ravel's Sonata for Violin and Cello was written from 1920 to 1922. He dedicated it to Claude Debussy, who had died in 1918. It premiered on 6 April 1922.

Max Reger's Serenade for Flute, Violin, and Viola is romantic music written in the early twentieth century. Reger was a German composer and conductor whose works could be considered retrospective, as they followed classical and baroque compositional techniques such as fugue and continuo. This chamber work is considered deeply reflective and unconventional.

Brahms' Piano Quartet in A Major was completed in 1861 and received its premiere in November 1862 by the Hellmesberger Quartet with the composer playing the piano part. It has been especially noted for drawing influence from composer Franz Schubert. This quartet is the longest of Brahms's chamber works and is one of the longest piano quartets in the
