### **Solution** Federal Reserve Cuts Interest Rates: Here's What That Means



to think that a blank canvas of earth was the way to get ready for winter. Get all the old stocks, leaves, and vines and put them in the compost pile. Leave the earth bare so there was nowhere for the insects to hide. Later, I learned Anybody can witness this as weeds scraggliest ground.

Now I know that there are multiflorous soil organisms that live underground and are necessary for all of our plants to grow and thrive. Taking everything out of the soil before winter leaves them nothing to eat and most of

them will die (rototilling or plowing in the spring kills them as well). So, it is best to either leave them some roots to chew on or provide them with some.

Winter Rye

have finished harvesting a bed, I make some circles in the soil about eight inches apart. I create little bowl-like depressions into which I plant 12 or 15 winter rye seeds. I cover them up but leave the depressions as they will act as rain catchers. The winter rye comes organisms. It also makes the garden look pretty as we head towards winter. When the cold weather does come, it will kill the winter rye but it will come back up when it warms up in the spring.

An added benefit of planting winter rye is that it makes excellent straw to cover the beds in the summer. Pick it before the seeds mature and set it out to dry. I like to give most of my beds – the ones with the larger plants like tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, broccoli, cabbage, summer and winter squashes - chopped up leaves covered with straw to help keep down the weeds. It also helps the beds to maintain moisture

When I first began gardening, I used as the summer heats up and gets dry.

One thing about the insects: Dan Kittredge of the Bionutrient Food Association says that if you give your plants everything that they need, the insects can't eat them – the sugars are too high. I put them with their leaves on is to plant some winter rye. Once I newspapers on the porch. You want to put these somewhere they can dry out so the dew doesn't get them. You need to protect them from the frost as well. After about two weeks, the greens can gently be separated from the corns. These I place in a bucket of wood chips similar to my beets and carrots. Put up quickly providing food for the soil down a layer of chips, place the corns not touching each other, and cover with more chips. When the bucket is full, you can cover it and place it in the root cellar or just a cool cellar. In the spring, I plant 10, then wait 10 days to two weeks and plant 10 more. I do this until they are all back in the ground. I enjoy picking bouquets for weeks in the summer.

Mix to combine and ladle onto oiled, heated griddle or fry pan. Cook one side until bubbles appear; turn and cook other side in the same manner.

### Vegetarian Pumpkin Chili

A very tasty no-meat option; serve with artisan bread.

**Ingredients:** 2 tablespoons vegetable oil

garlic

2 cups chopped onion 1 tablespoon minced

2 tablespoons chili powder, to taste

1 teaspoon ground allspice

<sup>2</sup> cups frozen baby lima beans

2 cups chopped peeled fresh or canned tomatoes

3 cups vegetable stock or water

- 2 cups pumpkin or winter squash, cut
- 2 cups eggplant, unpeeled, cut into  $1\frac{1}{2}$
- 1 cup frozen corn kernels, or cut fresh off-the-cob

freshly ground black pepper and salt

Combine oil, onions, and garlic in a heavy saucepan over medium-high pan large enough to hold pumpkin or heat. Cook, stirring occasionally, until winter squash, cut sides down. Place in onions wilt and begin to brown, about pan and bake at 375 degrees for 30 to 45 six to eight minutes. Add chili powder, minutes, or until tender (the larger it is, allspice, lima beans, tomatoes and the longer it will take). Allow to cool to stock; bring to a boil. Lower heat and simmer, covered, until spices begin to develop flavor, about 15 minutes. Add pumpkin and eggplant. Continue to cook, covered, until vegetables are very tender, about 25 to 30 minutes. The pumpkin will fall apart and give body to the sauce. Add corn, season with salt and pepper and cook until fresh maple syrup, applesauce, honey heated through. Chili can be served or your favorite jams. Makes six to eight immediately or refrigerated up to five days and reheated. Serve chili topped with chopped avocado and/or a dollop of sour cream, if desired. Makes six to



# Celebrating My Father's 100 Years in the October 1st issue, I couldn't help reflecting on

that date, because exactly 100 years earlier, my father

was born. He isn't here to celebrate this monumental

birthday, but I can't help feeling close to him as I



My father was one of 13 children born to a farming family in Maine. It was common to have large families where the children could help with the farm chores. He used to tell me that when he was a boy, he was sent to school in Canada because he misbehaved too much, and his brother was sent along with him to keep him out of trouble. I don't know how true that story was, but he liked to tell it.

My father saw a lot of major historic events. He was born in the 1920s, a few years after his father returned from fighting in World War I. The year he was born, F. Scott Fitzgerald published The Great Gatsby, the Scopes Monkey Trial was held, and the Tri-State Tornado hit Missouri, Illinois, and Indiana. That year saw the ongoing development of Mount Rushmore and the first successful transmission of television pictures.

He grew up in the time of the Great Depression, although the impact of the economic hardships were less severe in Maine than some other parts of the country. He saw World War II, and as soon as he was old enough, he followed older brothers in enlisting. The story he liked to tell was that he chose to join the Navy because he had a brother in the army and another in the Airforce already. He also decided to let the army medical team remove his tonsils since he had never had an operation and wanted to try it. He joined at the tail end of the war and did not en-

gage in much combat, but he like to share about the places he got to see in his travels and how he served on a submarine.

The war ended in 1945 and in 1946, he married my mother. My father was a short fellow, just five feet tall, and he carried the nickname Shorty. My mother was two inches taller. For their wedding photos, he stood on a box that was hidden by the train of her gown so he would appear taller than she was.

All my life, my father wore eye glasses. My mother always said that he had only needed the glasses for reading, but he insisted on wearing them constantly and ruined his eyesight in the process, causing him to need glasses all the time. As a kid, I would sometimes try on his glasses. They always made me feel a bit dizzy and gave me a headache if I kept them on too long.

I am the youngest of the seven children my parents had, and I always had a special bond with my dad. Not only did we have a large family, the age span between oldest and youngest is over 20 years, so he was parenting much of his adult life. My two oldest brothers were fighting in the Vietnam War when my mother was pregnant with me.

My experience of my father as a parent was a softer version, and my mother was the primary disciplinarian. He turned 44 the year I was born and had mellowed. I've been told he was much stricter and harsher as younger parent, but I did not see that

As I grew up, I learned that I was more likely to get a positive response when I asked my dad versus my mom, so I sometimes used that to my advantage. If I had a poor progress report in school and I knew I could get my grade up before the final report, I would get up early before he left for work to get a parent signature, with my mother being none the wiser.

I also helped him out on occasion. I remember a time when his family's lumber company from Maine had a baseball team and they happened to be playing a few games locally. He was proud and wanted to cheer them on. My mother didn't think he needed to attend multiple games, so when the second one was starting he said he had to go to the store and told me he was actually going to see the game. Of course I kept his secret, as he had mine.

I remember the day he retired from his job at Kingsbury. My parents had a plan for him to retire at the end of the year, but something happened at work. He came home midday and announced he had retired. I was still in high school at the time. My mom was not happy, but I was secretly proud that he stood up for himself.

He outlived my mom by 10 years. After her passing, he started attending reunions for the Navy, reconnecting with the men with whom he served. I think it helped him with the loneliness. Now I imagine they are reunited and hopefully celebrating his 100th together.

Happy 100th birthday, Dad!


