

Keene Pride Offers A Full Week Of Celebration Culminating In A Star-Studded Weekend Festival

The Monadnock region's most vibrant celebration of love, identity, and community returns as Keene Pride Week 2025 kicks off Sunday, September 14th, through Sunday, September 21st, bringing a full week of inclusive, joyful, and empowering events to Downtown Keene and beyond. Now in its fourth year, Keene Pride Week has grown into one of New Hampshire's most anticipated annual events, and this year promises to be the biggest and boldest yet. Keene Pride Festival is one of the largest Pride Festivals in all of New England.

Organized by Keene Pride, a nonprofit dedicated to uplifting the LGBTQ+ community throughout the region, this weeklong celebration features a diverse schedule of activities, including Pride Happy Hour & Sober Social Hour, coffee club meetup, drag brunch at Yellow Bell Cafe, drag open stage at Madame Sherri's, family picnic in the park, Friday night dance party at Madame Sherri's themed Hollywood Red Carpet, and much more throughout the week.

This one-night-only spectacular is custom-built for the Keene community and features over a dozen choreographed numbers, dazzling lights and video, and drag excellence. It is directed by Keene Pride founder and board president Adam Toepfer and co-directed and choreographed by Daniel Gold, working for months in NYC to bring this tribute to life. 





As we transition into September, it's exciting to we saw earnings revisions reach their highest point since August 2021, painting an optimistic picture for corporate performance.

Keeping Pre-Schoolers Engaged With Educational Play

can feel if there isn't structured play. And though unstructured play is great for preschoolers to help with problem-solving, creativity, and independence, throwing in some educational play not only keeps the little ones engaged but also helps to prepare them for school.



Here are a few engaging ideas:

Play-Doh Play

Give the child a plastic placemat and a container or two of Play-Doh. Have the kids make shapes: a square, a circle, a triangle, and a rectangle. Then ask: How are these shapes different? Is there anything that is the same with these shapes?

While you have the Play-Doh out, have them form balls in different sizes. Then have the kids order them by size, from small to large. After, give them toothpicks so they can make a sculpture by connecting the balls with the toothpicks.

Take a large ball of Play-Doh and mix in buttons and tiny plastic toys. Give the children kid-safe tweezers or tongs to get the items out of the ball of dough.

Flatten the Playdough and make impressions with plastic items, like doll or dinosaur feet, little GI Joe figurines, or other small toys. You could take a walk outside and gather up acorn caps or leaves to make impressions.

Get Creative

Give each child a box of SweeTarts and have them separate the colors into piles. Then have them count each color, write the total down on a sticky note, and leave the sticky note next to each pile. What is the color that has the most SweeTarts? What color has the least? Then take these sweet and sour candies and paste them onto a poster board to create a mosaic picture.

Do you have some old socks to get rid of? Using markers, glue, buttons, and yarn, let the children turn a sock into a sock puppet and then put on a puppet show for you. They can take this one step further and put on a puppet show for the entire family once they are all together.

Using a variety of colored markers and pasta like macaroni, ziti, or wheels - that can be strung on string or yarn, have the kids color each piece of pasta and then string each on whatever they are using for a necklace. Or, you can have them take it one step further and have them make a sequence of colors (i.e., blue, yellow, red, red, blue, yellow, red, red) to put on their necklace.

Outside Play

Outside play is great for a preschooler's physical and mental health. Adding outside play to your preschooler's learning experience can be as simple as using a kickball to pass back and forth or trying to run with the ball by kicking it around cones, chairs,

For kids who are learning letter identification, call out a letter, and they hop into that box and stay there until the next letter is called out. For kids who are learning to spell words, call out a word - say "cat" - and the child must spell out "cat" by hopping in the right boxes in order. You can also do this with numbers for those learning to identify numbers and for those learning to add small amounts.

> Take a nature color hunt. Using a piece of paper without lines, section the paper into four blocks. At the top of each block, write the name of a color using a crayon of that color. The idea is to have the child find something in nature with that color and then draw a picture of that something in the block. Some colors you could probably count on seeing in nature include brown, green, black, and blue. Add red and orange if venturing out in the fall.

> Preschoolers can absorb so much. By focusing on learning experiences at this age, they will be prepared for that first day of school.





Hummingbird In My Garden

When people ask me if I have a pet, I usually say hummingbird to conquer one's own or fruitful – for countless time, many "no." But sometimes, when I sit in my backyard, I feel as if I do. Of late, my (sort of) pet is a hummingbird - a female who I watch every morning as she flies hummingbird has been so present in between the two red hummingbird feeders I have placed outside, some 20 feet apart.

September – The Urgency Of Suicide Prevention By Deb Paul

September is Suicide Prevention Awareness Month, and it arrives at a critical time. As daylight wanes and the holidays approach, many people begin to feel the weight of depression and anxiety more acutely. For too many young people, these struggles end in tragedy. Suicide is now the second leading cause of death among teenagers and young adults – surpassed only by accidents. Behind every statistic is a grieving family and a community left asking what more could have been done

This is not just a sad reality; it's a public health crisis. Rates of depression among teens have surged in recent years. The causes are complex – social pressures, isolation, trauma – but the outcome is heartbreakingly clear: we are losing young lives far too soon.

This year, the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) launched its "Take the Moment" campaign, urging us to slow down, notice those around us, and break the silence that often surrounds mental health. The message is simple and profound: conversations save lives. When we speak openly about suicide and depression – without shame or judgment – we create space for people in crisis to ask for help.

Knowing the warning signs is another crucial step. The NAMI outlines simple but powerful actions anyone can take. Ask directly if someone is thinking about suicide. Keep them safe by limiting access to dangerous means. Be there – listen without judgment and offer reassurance. Connect them with professional help, whether through hotlines, doctors, or counselors. Stay in touch, because support must continue beyond the immediate crisis.

Many fear that talking about suicide might "plant the idea" in someone's mind. That is a myth, and a dangerous one. Silence doesn't protect, it isolates. Honest, compassionate conversations can be the first step toward healing.

As a community, we must do more. Schools should implement universal depression screening, with parental involvement, to identify struggling students early. Parents and educators must learn to recognize signs of distress and respond with empathy and urgency. Local leaders and elected officials must invest in accessible mental health care. Long wait lists and unaffordable treatment are barriers that put lives at risk.

Help is available now. Anyone in distress can call or text 988 to reach the Suicide & Crisis Lifeline. NAMI offers support at 1-lpline@nami.org.

We cannot afford to wait for more studies or better statistics. Every conversation, every resource, every step toward reducing stigma can save lives.



Perfect Season To Plan

Oh my goodness, this is the season of bliss in many of our gardens. We're harvesting various squashes and chards for cooking/freezing, herbs for drying, and here, the last of our cucumbers, beans, blueberries, and beets. Some of us even have second seedings growing for harvesting veggies later in the season! But I write today with a suggestion. This is also the time to plan, take steps toward a more satisfying, joyful, gardening season next year with even more pollinators, less weeding, less watering, more satisfying plantings, and better harvests.

Did you notice less pollinators in your gardens this year? Now is a terrific time to increase pollinator nesting opportunities in your yarden (yard + garden) for both wild bumble and the other 400 or so tiny, wild bees. Wild bees are our superheroes for pollinating the fruits and vegetables we grow at home. Maybe you're surprised to discover that honeybees, who are European, actually take a definite second place for pollinator effectiveness. Decide now where you'll leave small spots of open soil for female wild bees to dig nests into and overwinter. Cut and stack your daylily stems so that you can see their hollow centers. Tie them into bundles. Then stack these bundles in a corner of your yarden, welcoming our tiniest wild bees to burrow into, creating nests for their coming season's broods.



Right now is also when I'm gathering seeds from the broccoli, lettuce, other vegetables I've let flower, as well as some from many perennial plant seed pods for winter seed sowing. Paper shopping bags are great for holding upside-down flowering stalks until you separate seeds from their fluff or seed pods. Find a dry place to store the resulting paper envelopes of seeds when you're done. I like to give small paper coin envelopes of these seeds to friends as holiday gifts. Remember to label each envelope clearly.

Most healthy perennials can be divided soon. But also, notice which groundcover plants have thrived.

SPRING & SUMMER STORM PREPARATIONS

Now is a good time to strategize where else you can plant divided bits of each groundcover to other places below perennials and shrubs. That said, please don't use English Ivy or the dreaded Periwinkle. Yes, both are evergreen, but they are invasive, choking out entire plant communities in many of our wild areas. Native groundcover plants can also create a carpet, reducing weeding and watering while providing shelter for important insects. These plants make a green mulch – one that you do not need to buy/replace every spring.

Which ones? Consider two native and droughttolerant options. First, Running Groundsel, a strange name for an also-evergreen groundcover that thrives in sun or part-shade. Its small leaves have a purple hue through the winter. It grows three to six inches tall, spreading into a 24-inch carpet of small, rounded green leaves. Bonus: each plant sends up tiny stems of bright yellow flowers every spring. The easiest native plant I use is Wild Strawberry. Given time and regular watering to establish their roots, this sturdy spreader is both sun and part-shade tolerant. Growing two to five inches tall, the Native Plant Trust describes Wild Strawberry as "... support(ing) 75 different species of butterflies and moths (Lepidopterans) throughout (its) life cycle, supplying food for caterpillars and nectar for adult insects. It also supports numerous [other types of insects], and the fruits attract chipmunks, squirrels, and birds. Its flowers are accessible to short-tongued bees." Wild Strawberry is creating lovely carpets in several spots below and between my shrubs, trees, and perennials.

This is a "quick before we forget" activity. What plants did well where? What plants do I want to remove or transplant to a different location? What plants do I want to divide? Write these observations down for immediate or next spring's actions.

Take advantage of fabulous late summer weather to foster more pollinators for increased fruit and vegetable harvests; save seeds for sharing and less seed-shopping this winter; plant more "green mulch" groundcover for less watering, less weeding; and note what worked well in contrast to what you'd like to change. These actions will reap an even more wonderful gardening season next spring.

Tomatoes Are My Best Friend & Sloan Cosy Sheridan

Serve sliced tomatoes with fresh basil leaves and slices of fresh mozzarella or Italian Fontina cheese; drizzle with extra virgin olive oil. Prepare a garden-fresh tomato sauce or soup. Serve tomatoes as a side dish or in an entree. Whether you use them in salads, main dishes or canning, the red, juicy, vine-ripened tomato is a food beyond compare. Today, tomatoes are cultivated throughout the world, where people continue to enjoy eating and cooking with new varieties as well as rediscovered heirlooms. Celebrate fresh tomatoes and enjoy the friendship.

A Different Hummus

This 'hummus' is made with whole chickpeas, enlivened with tomatoes, feta cheese, and herbs, then heated in a hot oven. Try it as an appetizer or light lunch for four.

Ingredients:

4 oz. block of feta cheese

1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil

1 cup cherry tomatoes, halves

1 clove garlic, finely chopped

pinch of red pepper flakes, to taste salt and freshly ground black pepper, as desired

1 can chickpeas, drained and rinsed well

2 tablespoons chopped herbs of choice flatbread for serving

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Put feta cheese in a baking dish; pour olive oil over the top. Add cherry tomatoes; sprinkle on garlic, pepper flakes, salt and pepper. Heat in oven for 15 minutes; remove from oven, add chickpeas, and turn in oil once. Return to oven and bake for 10 minutes more. Transfer dish to under a broiler and heat five to eight minutes longer, the-box recipe a quick and easy way to use late sumuntil lightly browned. Stir to mix feta. Sprinkle with herbs and serve with flatbread.

Saut Nicoise

Unlike the popular salad Nicoise, this simple recipe features the same ingredients sautéed in a skillet for a stovetop meal. Makes four to six servings. **Ingredients:**

1/2 lb. each green and yellow beans, trimmed (or 1 lb. green beans)

3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil

1 medium sweet onion, quartered and thinly sliced 2 cloves garlic, finely minced

6 ripe plum tomatoes, quartered

salt and freshly ground black pepper

1 can (6½ oz.) light tuna, packed in oil, drained and

1/3 cup basil, cut into julienne strips small black oil-cured olives for garnish

In large pot of boiling water, cook green beans until just tender, about five minutes; run under cold water to stop the cooking. Pat beans dry with paper towels and cut into 1½ inch pieces; set aside. In large skillet, heat oil over medium-low heat. Add onion NH 03449. and garlic; cook until soft but not browned, about eight to 10 minutes. Add tomatoes, season with salt and pepper, and cook until tomato juices have evaporated, stirring frequently. (The tomatoes should still retain their shape.) Add beans and tuna and just heat through; fold in basil. Garnish with black olives and serve hot from the skillet.

Chicken, Tomatoes & Orzo This is a Greek-inspired dish, full of the flavors of

oregano, feta cheese, tomato and orzo pasta. Easily prepared in one pan, it serves four. **Ingredients:**

- 2 cans chicken broth (14½ oz. each)
- 1 small onion, finely chopped
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 2 cups uncooked orzo
- 3/4 lb. boneless, skinless chicken breast, diced 3 cups washed, torn spinach leaves (large stems
- removed)
- 1 large tomato, seeded and chopped

1/2 cup Feta cheese, crumbled

In a large skillet, heat broth, onion and oregano to a boil. Add orzo; reduce heat, cover and simmer for six minutes, stirring occasionally. Add chicken; cook for six minutes longer, or until chicken and orzo are cooked. Stir in spinach and tomato; heat just until spinach wilts. Remove from heat, top with cheese and serve.

A Special Tomato Salad
This attractive tomato salad variation is topped with a crunchy mixture of fried onions and seeds, prosciutto, fresh herbs for flavor and a light vinaigrette - Wainwright will appear perfect for a light lunch with some homemade bread. **Ingredients:**

Topping: 1 tablespoon toasted sesame seeds; 2 tablespoons roasted sunflower or pumpkin seeds; 1 cup store-bought, roughly chopped fried onions: Combine ingredients in a small bowl and set aside.

Vinaigrette: 1/4 small shallot, minced; 11/2 tablespoons Sherry vinegar (or rice wine vinegar); 1/4 teaspoon Dijon mustard; 1/4 cup olive oil; salt to taste: Combine ingredients in a jar; shake and set aside.

For Salad: 6 or 8 heirloom tomatoes, quartered; 2 cups cherry tomatoes of different colors, halved; 4 ounces prosciutto or speck, cut in bite-size; 1 or 2 tablespoons fresh tarragon and/or mint leaves,

In a large, shallow bowl, toss tomatoes with prosciutto pieces and enough vinaigrette to lightly coat it all. Scatter seed-onion mixture over the top and garnish with the herbs. Serve immediately at room temperature. Serves four to six.



Tomato-Zucchini Pie

Two plentiful garden vegetables make this offmer produce. Serve alone, or with BBQ meat, fish or poultry. Serves six.

Ingredients:

2 cups chopped zucchini

1 cup chopped tomato

1/2 cup chopped onion 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese

1½ cups milk

3/4 cup Bisquick mix

3 large eggs salt and pepper to taste

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Grease a 10-inch deep-dish pie plate or quiche dish. Sprinkle zucchini, tomato, onion and grated cheese in the bottom of dish/pie plate. In a bowl, beat remaining ingredients until smooth; pour over vegetable/cheese mixture. Bake until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean about 30 minutes. Cool five minutes before


