

Growing A Food-Full, Urban Oasis

I see the Goldfinches flitting through the gardens is the lovely Fringe tree, bearing small black berries here, swaying on the Cutleaf Coneflower, Queen of the Prairie, and Coreopsis stems as they feast on seeds. The weather is changing quickly now. Myriad colors of leaves of different perennials, groundcover plants and shrubs abound. My mind's eye notes the shade and ornamental tree saplings on the outer edges of this "yarden." They don't look like much right now. Many are no taller than four to six feet, still spindly but growing steadily.

For me, designing an edible landscape means fruits, vegetables, and seeds for not only my family but for the broader wildlife community as well. I read a quote recently from a fellow gardener that felt apt. Lindsey Sheehan of @ruralsprout writes as part of her newsletter postscript, that she gardens "One for the mouse, one for the crow, one to rot, and one to grow."

Our tiny, urban parcel went from being grass with raised vegetable beds in 2017, to now holding three, 10' (up to 80'), Red Oaks along our parkway with a 20' tall Red Pine (up to 80') and 15' tall Spruce (up to 50'), providing pinecone seeds to critters and a bit of protection for the house from our northwest winter winds. Moving clockwise at the outside edge of the parcel, a mature, understory, Redbud tree, 20' tall, creates seeds as well as a shady haven at the back gate with a Beach Plum, also now fully grown at 6' tall, just past the raised vegetable beds and grape arbor.

Another Red Oak (gotta love our acorn-planting squirrels) now towers some 25' above anchoring the yarden's northeast corner. This will grow, like those along the Beech Street Parkway, up to 80' tall one day, someday to be much closer to the first of two of the yarden's PawPaws. These understory trees are not yet bearing their vanilla/peach custard-flavored fruits. This one is currently six feet but could grow up to 30 feet tall along our eastern border. Next to it

and currently 10 feet tall but could grow up to 20 feet which will also, someday, be under the canopy of an adjacent Swamp White Oak, currently a tiny five feet tall up to 80 feet, midway along our eastern border (see the Swamp White Oak sapling photo).

Almost at the southwest corner is a young four feet, Black Tupelo tree that could someday be 60 feet tall with berries. Across the alley in the southwest corner is a Red Mulberry tree, 10 feet someday up to 30 feet tall.

Do you happen to remember these berries from your childhood like me? They are quite nutritious and will soon begin to feed us, birds, and other wildlife while its leaves feed the caterpillars. Ready for my frequent refrain? Caterpillars are needed to feed our

Along the alley and around a tiny patio are lovely, now mature, 20 feet tall Juneberry shrubs that bear each season's earliest small fruits. My daughter competes with the birds for these tiny, acrid berries filled with nutrients as well. In fact, these berries exceed blueberries' nutritional content. A Chokecherry tree will soon grow 12 feet tall alongside our interior sidewalk next to a peach tree that I keep trimmed to human height. A fast-growing and stunning, though short-lived, understory, Pagoda Dogwood has achieved its mature 20 feet tall crown of golden leaves. Its blue berries are nearly all eaten now by the birds and squirrels. And lastly, a glorious Hazelnut shrub has quickly grown to its mature nine feet tall height at the house's southwest corner. Its golden leaves and dress-like, fancy nuts are a delight to us all.

Will this landscape change over time from my initial vision? You bet. Unforeseen aspects, as in all of life, will arise. But I welcome how, in particular, our backyard habitat will evolve from its current open and sunny character, to a veritable wonderland of shade, berries, and other fruit and nuts for us all.

Clove Of Garlic, Clove Of Hope

Our farmer friends moved away some time ago, to a new farm in Maine. We hated to see them go, but wished them well in a new chapter of their lives. We were also wishing them well because they gave us some good farm stuff before they left.

We were glad for a batch of nearly new wooden stakes, as our originally seven-foot stakes have deteriorated into three or four footers after many seasons of use. We were also glad for some secondhand landscape fabric, which we've been wanting to try for years. We've used all kinds of weeding methods – from straw mulch to hoes to cultivators to compostable plastics. But we still can't keep up.



Last spring, we laid the fabric out in one of our greenhouses, with the encouragement of our faithful volunteer, who has valiantly tackled many garden beds overrun by weeds. She is also a good worrier, and emailed us in the middle of the night: "I was doing some research and maybe it'll be too hot and what if it kills all your tomatoes!"

We laughed blithely, and transplanted the tomatoes and peppers. A few weeks later, when our farmer group came to our place, we proudly showed off our landscape fabric. "We've never used it before,"

When they got done laughing, as in "Ba ha ha! You've never used it before?" we told them we did something else new: "We usually plant the tomatoes 18 inches apart, but we tried a foot apart for the first time. What do you think?"

"How come?" someone asked, probably thinking we had made some great new discovery about tomato productivity.


"Because that's where the holes were in our new used fabric," we answered, and then we had another round of laughter.

Happily the tomatoes and peppers did not die from overheating. In fact, they thrived. There was nary a weed in sight, except, of course, in the last quarter of one bed, because the fabric wasn't long enough. There the weeds were impressively large and the peppers were impressively spindly.

We were stunned by the difference. Suddenly we had new hope: a possibility for two mid- to late-50s farmers to keep on farming. "Let's cover the whole farm in plastic!" enthused my fellow.

Yes," I agreed, "Let's cover as many of the garden beds and pathways as we can in woven polymer! It's not perfect, but it's pretty good. It lasts for years, and it means we might be able to handle the work without collapsing!"

We went right out and bought ourselves a 15 foot wide roll of fabric, to get us started on next year's weed-free garden. We rolled it out along our dirt road, a project the farm pooch found pretty exciting. He roared down the 200 feet length of fabric and leapt over the rest of the roll at the far end, over and over again, until he was puffing hard.



Now this looks interesting, said the farm pooch. Well, maybe not that flaming tool, but this farmer crawling along sure is.

Since I wouldn't let the pooch chew on my yardstick, he got nosy with my chalk. Luckily I had an extra piece, which I gave to him. Then he spent the next half hour throwing the chalk in the air, chasing and pouncing on it, which gave us more time to work. We ended up with holey chalk, and holey fabric.

The next day my fellow and I laid the fabric out in the garden, stapled it down, and planted a clove of garlic into each hole. A clove of garlic, and a clove of hope that we can manage to keep on farming.

Cranberries Deserve Year 'Round Use

Now is the time of year when freshly-harvested cranberries are in plentiful supply for traditional uses juice, sugar, and orange zest in small during the upcoming holiday seasons. Store displays are loaded with bags of sparkling cranberries, ready to be made into relishes, breads, cookies, pies and other desserts. It's also the time when I stock up on these lovely fruits for use all year 'round. Whenever I shop during the next few months, I'll buy five or six bags of cranberries to put in my freezer for future mixing until combined. Add nuts and use. I've discovered many ways to use cranberries in refrigerate until ready to use. cooking throughout the year, including such dishes as pork roast, meatballs, with assorted vegetables, winter fruit salads, cranberry juice and smoothies, chutneys and salsas, vinaigrettes, appetizers, dips and sauces, etc. So, if you enjoy cooking with cranberries, stock up on some extra bags of cranberries this fall. Extra bags can be frozen easily – just toss each bag, as is, into your freezer and they are good for eight to 12 months.

Cranberry Nut Butter

When ready to use, bring butter to room temperature and serve to spread on muffins or bread; or brush on grilled or baked chicken as it cooks.
