





The Memoir Workshops With Pam Bernard Fall Sessions

Award-winning author Pam Bernard will hold her popular memoir workshops this fall. They will begin the week of November 10th and continue through early January. Days and times vary depending on which workshop is most appropriate for each writer.

Writing memoir involves more than recounting experience. In fact, the compelling memoir has little to do with verifiable experience. Rather, the work of memoir is in the struggle to understand what to do with that experience, how to perceive it as the adult narrator who receives flashes of memory, often unbidden. Ultimately, the central task of memoir is to fashion a narrative, to weave the disparate threads of our lives into a story with which a reader can identify, because that story is, above all, emotionally true.

"We never really know ourselves until we begin to write about our unique experience. A safe, nurturing space in which to begin is crucial, to experiment, to challenge one's assumptions," Bernard explains. These workshops combine the serious study of craft - narration, voice, tone – with ample writing from prompts. During each workshop, participants will begin a fresh draft, as well as have the opportunity for existing drafts to be critiqued by the group.

The Solar Revolution Is Here

Thunderclap Newman said it best: "There's something in the air, we've got to get it together sooner or later, because the revolution is here." Finally, the solar revolution: solar is taking over. It's cheaper, cleaner, and allows for energy independence. What's not to like? As climate activist Bill McKibben says, "We live on a planet where the cheapest way to make power is to point a sheet of glass at the sun." Clean energy is what we need if we are to avoid the worst impacts of climate change.

Although solar provides only 7 percent of the world's electricity right now, that amount is expected to double by 2026. Solar energy has grown faster than any other energy source throughout history. It took from 1954 to 2022 to install the first one terawatt of solar power (=TW=one trillion watts), but then only another two years to install the second terawatt. China is leading the way in this – installing one gigawatt per day (=GW=1 billion watts), about 100 panels every second!

10 MINUTES FROM KEENE

Here in the US, the solar revolution is also going wild: In 2024, 61 percent of new electricity generation came from solar, adding a record 30 GW to the US grid; this trend is expected to continue in 2025. While California currently leads the country in amount of installed solar, another big state will soon overtake it - Texas! With abundant sunshine, a rising population, a streamlined permit system, and money from the federal government, Texas will add 11.6 GW of new solar power this year.



What are the forces behind the revolution? As former President Bill Clinton famously quipped, "It's the economy, stupid!" While electricity prices overall have increased in New England, mostly because of changes in natural gas prices, infrastructure problems and increased demand (AI centers and electric vehicles, etc.), solar electricity prices have declined. Because of efficient technology, cheaper components and large-scale manufacturing, the cost of solar panels has decreased 64 to 82 percent since 2010. Generating electricity from solar costs 2 to 9 cents per kilowatt-hour (=kWh) (on a utility scale, it is more expensive for a homeowner), compared to 4 to 8 cents per kWhfrom natural gas power plants, 14 to 18 cents for nuclear power, 4 to 8 cents for wind turbines on land, 7 to 16 cents for offshore wind and 4 and 5 cents for electricity from existing hydropower.

This isn't the only good news on the energy front. According to the US Energy Information Administration, about 7.7 GW of wind capacity will be added to the US grid in 2025, despite roadblocks and misinformation. (Wind turbines do not kill whales! In fact, ocean-based wind turbine structures often enhance marine habitats, acting as artificial reefs, attracting fish and other ocean creatures and creating great fishing spots. Talk to the recreational fishermen off Block Island for some tips.) Half of the new wind energy installations will happen in Texas, Wyoming, and Massachusetts. For example, Vineyard Wind, between Martha's Vineyard and Block Island, is almost complete, bringing 800-megawatt (MW) of clean energy to the east coast.

Since the sun doesn't always shine, and the wind doesn't always blow, a key to the clean energy future is battery storage, which is also soaring. In 2024, the highest amount of battery storage – 10.3 GW – was added, and analysts expect that record to be broken in $2025\,with$ an additional record $18.2\,GW$ of additional battery storage.





Wildlife Activities In November

fall towards the end of November. Much of our natu-thousands and thousands of starlings flying in uniral world breathes a deep sigh before their winter rest. But, before that happens, there's still plenty of

We are approaching our coldest and darkest months of the year. The dramatic reduction in daylight hours and plummeting temperatures are clear cues for wildlife. For many mammals, it's time to prepare their winter hibernation dens. Bears prepare for hibernation by engaging in a period of intense like a murmur. eating called hyperphagia, where they consume large amounts of food to build up significant fat reserves. Not all wildlife goes dormant during the colder months. For birds, it's time to search for food. In fact, the countryside is full of wildlife activity in

This is a really good time to spot mammals scurrying about trying to find a suitable place to hibernate. They're particularly fond of wooded areas and leaf piles. Mice, squirrels, voles, and chipmunks are busy filling their nests and burrows for winter. Typically, they can be found around dense, low growth and woodland foraging for food. If you walk along the woods this month, take it slow and listen.

Also, field mice try to get into garages and homes if you live in the countryside. We have had an abundance of mice finding their way into our garage, more than we ever had in years past. I've been watching the chipmunks in our yard scurrying back and forth across the back deck with cheeks full of either birdseed or acorns. They've been very busy and their stretchy cheek pouches can hold up to 70 sunflower seeds or 12 acorns!

Fox are also active this month, both in urban and rural areas. They'll be breaking away from the safety of the family unit in search of new territories to breed. So, a walk this month, particularly during the evening, may indeed feature a bold and adventurous fox.

Listen to the wind whistling through bare trees, the crunch of leaves and acorns underfoot, or the sounds of migrating geese that create the soundscape of November woods. In some areas, you may notice low water levels in streams and ponds due to drought banquet we present for them each day. We also put conditions, as seen in parts of New Hampshire this

There's a lot to be said about birds during November and through winter. Our pair of cardinals have come back again, and the juncos, black-capped chickadees, blue jays, sparrows, and our family of mourning doves are back feeding in our yard. We call the black-capped chickadees our "bush" birds as they enjoy our huge bush out back where we toss birdseed. They all hang out and enjoy the privacy and protection of this 15-foot diameter evergreen bush just beyond our deck where we enjoy watching them, especially our cat, Lukas. They are great entertainment for him during the morning and early evenings when they all come around to feed. We have a very busy yard during the winter months.

Starlings deserve their own spotlight. In November, you might be lucky enough to witness one of the most stunning natural spectacles there is: a starling

HCS Is Celebrating 118 Years of Service



Murmurations mainly occur during the fall and winter months, with peak activity often between November and February. They typically happen at dusk as the birds gather to roost, and sometimes in the morning as they leave their roosts. The specific locations vary, but they can be seen in open areas like the countryside, near bodies of water, or even in cities. Some organizations maintain hotlines during the season to provide up-to-date information on where the birds are roosting.

We actually look forward to the winter months so we can watch our feathered friends visit and feed in our backyard. I notice they all get along well together, too. The squirrels don't bother the birds and the birds are very kind to one another. I've never seen them squabble, they give each other space and enjoy the some seed on the deck, and Lukas enjoys a front row view as he sits on the dining room chair watching through the picture window. Seeing the birds keeps him happy and out of mischief!

> After the affair, create a habit of debriefing with your children. This can be on a car ride home or just before bed. Spend some time talking about the gathering. You can ask questions such as what their favorite part was, if they learned anything interesting about relatives they spent time with, if anything happened that was surprising, if anything made them scared, sad, or uncomfortable, and if there is anything they would like to change before the next gathering.



While many people find calm in enjoying a single cup of tea in the comfort of their favorite chair, welcoming friends and neighbors to share 'a cuppa' in your home offers a jolly time.

Serving tea can be as simple or complex as desired, ranging from a single pot of tea and a plate of biscuits to a tiered dish offering bite-sized sandwiches, scones, and sweet or savory pastries. A tea table can be set with pretty cups, simple plates and napkins or go elegant with fine china, silver, and flowers. Before the rush of holiday entertainment, consider sharing the time-honored rituals of teatime with a few friends - it's an invaluable chance to slow down for a few restorative hours of quiet.



Gingerbread Raisin Scones

Wonderful served with some clotted cream or

whipped cream. **Ingredients:**

2 cups flour

1/3 cup packed dark brown sugar

1 tablespoon baking powder

3/4 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon ginger

1/8 teaspoon cloves

6 tablespoons chilled butter, cut into pieces 1/4 cup milk

1 large egg

3 tablespoons molasses

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

2/3 cup raisins

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Lightly grease a baking sheet. Blend flour, sugar, baking powder, and spices in a food processor, or combine in a mixing bowl. Add butter and process until mixture resembles coarse meal (or cut in butter with a pastry blender or knives). In a bowl, beat milk, egg, molasses, and vanilla to blend. Add flour mixture and raisins; stir gently until dough forms. Gather dough into a ball. On lightly floured surface, press dough into a oneinch thick round. Cut round into eight wedges and place on prepared baking sheet. Bake until toothpick inserted into center comes out clean, about 25 minutes. Serve warm or at room temperature.

Salmon Tea Sandwiches

These sandwiches, served on pumpernickel bread, are a nice contrast in taste and color to any assorted sweets.

Ingredients:

1/4 lb. thinly sliced smoked salmon

1/2 (8-ounce) pkg. cream cheese, softened

1 tablespoon chopped fresh dill

1 package square pumpernickel party bread

In food processor, chop salmon and cream cheese until smooth. With rubber spatula, fold in dill until well mixed. Spread salmon mixture evenly over half the bread slices and top with rest of bread. Cut each

sandwich diagonally into two triangles; if you had to use a larger pumpernickel bread, cut into four triangles. Place on tray or plate; cover with slightly damp towel or plastic wrap. Refrigerate until serving time. Makes 48 tea sandwiches.

Chutney Crescents

Quite easy to make and an attractive and tasty addition to a tea party.

Ingredients:

1/2 cup butter, room temp.

1 (3 oz.) pkg. cream cheese, room temp. 1 cup flour

1/2 cup chutney, your own or purchased

1/4 cup sugar mixed with 1 teaspoon cinnamon

Combine and cream together the butter and cream cheese in a bowl. Add flour and continue to mix to combine. Chill dough overnight. Remove dough from refrigerator 30 minutes before use.

dough into three-inch rounds. Place a small spoonful of chutney on each round; fold over each and press edges together with a fork or fingers. Bake on ungreased sheet pan for 13 to 15 minutes. When cool, roll in cinnamon-sugar.

Pots de Crème

These small pots of chocolate pudding are made in a blender and a lovely addition to any teatime table. **Ingredients:**

6 ounces semi-sweet or dark chocolate chips

1 tablespoon sugar

1 large egg

1 teaspoon vanilla extract pinch of kosher salt

1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons heavy cream

whipped cream and cocoa powder for garnish

Place four to six small pots, ramekins or tea cups on a plate or pan. Place chocolate chips, sugar, egg, vanilla, and salt in a blender container. Pulse a few times to mix the ingredients. Remove center cap from the blender cover and place a small funnel into the opening. Pour cream into a microwave-safe bowl. Make sure it's a large enough bowl/cup as mixture will bubble up when heated. Heat on high power for about 1½ minutes, or until cream is vigorously boiling. Turn blender on low speed and blend for 15 seconds. Slowly begin pouring the hot cream into the funnel. Once all cream has been added, place your hand on the funnel to keep it in place and increase blender speed to high. Blend for one minute, then pour into prepared pots and refrigerate for one hour. Can be made two to three days in advance. Cover with plastic wrap when storing. Serve with a dollop of whipped cream and dust it with a bit of cocoa powder, if desired.

Pistachio-Raisin Biscotti

These twice-baked treats will keep wrapped for up to a week.

Ingredients:

21/4 cups flour

3/4 cup sugar

3/4 cup shelled, unsalted pistachio nuts 3/4 cup golden raisins

1½ teaspoons baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt 3 large eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In medium bowl, mix flour, sugar, pistachios, raisins, baking powder, and alt. In small bowl, whisk together eggs and vanilla, add to flour mixture and use hands if necessary to mix it well (dough will be stiff). Divide dough in half. On lightly floured surface, roll each dough half into a 12-inch log. Place logs on a baking sheet and gently press to a 7/8-inch thickness. Bake until risen and firm, 15 to 20 minutes. Cool completely on baking sheet, about 30 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 300 degrees. On a cutting board, use a serrated knife to cut logs into 1/2-inch thick slices. Lay slices in a single layer on baking sheet. Bake until dry and just starting to brown, 15 to 20 minutes. Transfer to a rack to cool completely. Makes 48 biscotti.



Honoring Our Ancestors

the honoring of ancestors of various types.

As I write, it will be Halloween (or Samhain or Day of the Dead) in a few days. And beneath the plastic masks and store-bought candies and blown-up decorations of skeletons and such, this time is spiritually about connecting with the ancestral realm. Believed by many people of many sacred traditions to inhabit a different, yet sometimes interconnected, realm than ours. These ancestors like to be remembered, sometimes, by us, the living.



In Chile, where I lived for more than a decade, November 1st was a national holiday. I so enjoyed seeing whole families with picnic baskets perched atop the grave of a deceased family member, eating their favorite foods, laughing, singing, re-remembering those who have passed away with joy. The future generations will keep the knowledge and memory of these people close to their hearts.

by bloodline. For there are many kinds of ancestors that support and help us in our short walk on planet Earth. There are the deceased loved ones with whom that has transpired here in the sometimes happy, we may not share any blood connection – people who may have helped raise and/or sustain us. There are those with whom we once frolicked and laughed and ate with who have left this realm before us.

And then there are also those we once had a mixed kind of relationship with that are still close to us, energetically speaking. For reconciliation and healing continues after physical death, in both directions.

There are also ancestors of place. One kind of ancestor of place are the human beings who walked upon this land long before we did. We know that there have been people living in this region for at least 12,600 years. A sign by the Junior High School running field reminds us of this truth – Tenant Swamp.

So, too, does the large mural at 9 Court Street – People of the Dawnland.

The celebration of Thanksgiving is allegedly about the honoring of natives and whites at a harvest festival. In truth, the story of this celebration is bloodier and more convoluted than what I was taught in elementary school some decades ago. Check out this article in the Smithsonian magazine

How can we honor these ancestors of place in a heart-full and also truthful manner? I find this challenging when I know well the legacy of some of my ancestors, who arrived here from Europe, had their lands and spaces seized with guns and force. This can be so hard to acknowledge that some people, it seems, want to not talk about it at all. Some even deny it.

To this big question, I have no real answer. Not

(A few years ago, when I wrote about the true story of Thanksgiving in my column, I received hateful phone calls. I was harassed.)

I once heard a New Hampshire representative in Concord state that there have never been any Native Americans in New Hampshire. Ever. And yet our region - the Monadnock Region - is named for a mountain with a Western Abenaki name meaning, probably, "isolated mountain." Although it might mean "smooth mountain."

The river that flows through the heart of Keene is also named by the ancestors of place, the Western Abenaki. Ashuelot means "Land between Place" in Western Abenaki. The river way and its environs have been a major crossroads for millennia.

These physical presences of mountain and river Our ancestors can be viewed more widely than can also be thought of as our ancestors. For they are more ancient than even the most ancient of humanbeings. And they have known and witnessed all sometimes sad, sometimes complicated course of our human histories (and her-stories).

There are many ways to honor our land and landmarks, just as there are many paths to trying to honor (as best as we can) the ancestors, those human beings, of place. And, also, our own personal ancestors whose memories and blood flow through our veins as genes and stories and whispers.

Love is always a good way to start, and end.




